SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Makes technical corrections to Public Contracting Code. Exempts certain energy savings performance contracts from only competitive bidding requirements. Corrects references to economically distressed areas. **Revises provisions relating to wages and hours. Modifies and clarifies provisions relating to procurement procedures.** Clarifies when cooperative procurement contracts may be used. Specifies that state contracting agencies may designate certain contracts as personal services contracts. Requires contracting agencies to identify characteristics of class of contracts in making findings necessary for exemption from competitive bidding requirements for class of public improvement contracts. Permits submission of bids and proposals electronically. Requires contracting agencies to issue notice of intent to award public improvement contracts. Exempts small public improvement contracts from bond requirements. Requires successful bidder on public improvement contract to deliver proof of insurance to contracting agency. [*Permits adjustment in required bond amount.*]

Declares emergency, effective March 1, 2005.

9 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

10 **SECTION 1.** ORS 200.170 is amended to read:

11 200.170. (1) Subject to subsection (2) of this section, in order to be eligible for assistance under
12 ORS 200.005 and 200.150 to 200.200, the applicant must:

13 (a) Be determined to be an emerging small business pursuant to ORS 200.150;

14 (b) Have not been found to be eligible for such assistance in more than seven calendar years;

15 (c) Show that the applicant's place of business and the work in which the applicant seeks to
16 participate are located in this state; and

17 (d) Show that the applicant is in compliance with applicable licensing and registration require-
18 ments.

19 (2) The Department of Transportation may limit eligibility for assistance on a specific project
20 or contract to emerging small businesses that are located in or draw a part of their workforce from
21 economically [*depressed*] **distressed** areas in this state, as designated by the Economic and Com-

1 community Development Department in consultation with the Employment Department.

2 (3) The applicant for assistance under ORS 200.005 and 200.150 to 200.200 must perform at least
3 51 percent of the labor on any public improvement or maintenance project for which assistance is
4 received using the applicant's own workforce.

5 **SECTION 1a.** ORS 279A.010 is amended to read:

6 279A.010. (1) As used in the Public Contracting Code, unless the context or a specifically ap-
7 plicable definition requires otherwise:

8 (a) "Bidder" means a person that submits a bid in response to an invitation to bid.

9 (b) "Contracting agency" means a public body authorized by law to conduct a procurement.
10 "Contracting agency" includes, but is not limited to, the Director of the Oregon Department of Ad-
11 ministrative Services and any person authorized by a contracting agency to conduct a procurement
12 on the contracting agency's behalf. "Contracting agency" does not include the judicial department
13 or the legislative department.

14 (c) "Days" means calendar days.

15 (d) "Department" means the Oregon Department of Administrative Services.

16 (e) "Director" means the Director of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services or a
17 person designated by the director to carry out the authority of the director under the Public Con-
18 tracting Code.

19 (f) "Emergency" means circumstances that:

20 (A) Could not have been reasonably foreseen;

21 (B) Create a substantial risk of loss, damage or interruption of services or a substantial threat
22 to property, public health, welfare or safety; and

23 (C) Require prompt execution of a contract to remedy the condition.

24 (g) "Energy savings performance contract" means a public contract between a contracting
25 agency and a qualified energy service company for the identification, evaluation, recommendation,
26 design and construction of energy conservation measures, including a design-build contract, that
27 guarantee energy savings or performance.

28 (h) "Executive department" has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.112.

29 (i)(A) "Grant" means:

30 (i) An agreement under which a contracting agency receives moneys, property or other assist-
31 ance, including but not limited to federal assistance that is characterized as a grant by federal law
32 or regulations, loans, loan guarantees, credit enhancements, gifts, bequests, commodities or other
33 assets, from a grantor for the purpose of supporting or stimulating a program or activity of the
34 contracting agency and in which no substantial involvement by the grantor is anticipated in the
35 program or activity other than involvement associated with monitoring compliance with the grant
36 conditions; or

37 (ii) An agreement under which a contracting agency provides moneys, property or other assist-
38 ance, including but not limited to federal assistance that is characterized as a grant by federal law
39 or regulations, loans, loan guarantees, credit enhancements, gifts, bequests, commodities or other
40 assets, to a recipient for the purpose of supporting or stimulating a program or activity of the re-
41 cipient and in which no substantial involvement by the contracting agency is anticipated in the
42 program or activity other than involvement associated with monitoring compliance with the grant
43 conditions.

44 (B) "Grant" does not include a public contract for a public improvement, for public works, as
45 defined in ORS 279C.800, or for emergency work, minor alterations or ordinary repair or mainte-

1 nance necessary to preserve a public improvement, when under the public contract a contracting
2 agency pays, in consideration for contract performance intended to realize or to support the real-
3 ization of the purposes for which grant funds were provided to the contracting agency, moneys that
4 the contracting agency has received under a grant.

5 (j) "Industrial oil" means any compressor, turbine or bearing oil, hydraulic oil, metal-working
6 oil or refrigeration oil.

7 (k) "Judicial department" has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.113.

8 (L) "Legislative department" has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.114.

9 (m) "Local contract review board" means a local contract review board described in ORS
10 279A.060.

11 (n) "Local contracting agency" means a local government or special government body authorized
12 by law to conduct a procurement. "Local contracting agency" includes any person authorized by a
13 local contracting agency to conduct a procurement on behalf of the local contracting agency.

14 (o) "Local government" has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.116.

15 (p) "Lowest responsible bidder" means the lowest bidder who:

16 (A) Has substantially complied with all prescribed public contracting procedures and require-
17 ments;

18 (B) Has met the standards of responsibility set forth in ORS 279B.110 or 279C.375;

19 (C) Has not been debarred or disqualified by the contracting agency under ORS 279B.130 or
20 279C.440; and

21 (D) If the advertised contract is a public improvement contract, is not on the list created by the
22 Construction Contractors Board under ORS 701.227.

23 (q) "Lubricating oil" means any oil intended for use in an internal combustion crankcase,
24 transmission, gearbox or differential or an automobile, bus, truck, vessel, plane, train, heavy equip-
25 ment or machinery powered by an internal combustion engine.

26 (r) "Person" means a natural person capable of being legally bound, a sole proprietorship, a
27 corporation, a partnership, a limited liability company or partnership, a limited partnership, a for-
28 profit or nonprofit unincorporated association, a business trust, two or more persons having a joint
29 or common economic interest, any other person with legal capacity to contract or a public body.

30 (s) "Post-consumer waste" means a finished material that would normally be disposed of as solid
31 waste, having completed its life cycle as a consumer item. "Post-consumer waste" does not include
32 manufacturing waste.

33 (t) "Price agreement" means a public contract for the procurement of goods or services at a set
34 price with:

35 (A) No guarantee of a minimum or maximum purchase; or

36 (B) An initial order or minimum purchase combined with a continuing contractor obligation to
37 provide goods or services in which the contracting agency does not guarantee a minimum or maxi-
38 mum additional purchase.

39 (u) "Procurement" means the act of purchasing, leasing, renting or otherwise acquiring goods
40 or services. "Procurement" includes each function and procedure undertaken or required to be
41 undertaken by a contracting agency to enter into a public contract, administer a public contract and
42 obtain the performance of a public contract under the Public Contracting Code.

43 (v) "Proposer" means a person that submits a proposal in response to a request for proposals.

44 (w) "Public body" has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.109.

45 (x) "Public contract" means a sale or other disposal, or a purchase, lease, rental or other ac-

1 quisation, by a contracting agency of personal property, services, including personal services, public
2 improvements, public works, minor alterations, or ordinary repair or maintenance necessary to pre-
3 serve a public improvement. “Public contract” does not include grants.

4 (y) “Public contracting” means procurement activities described in the Public Contracting Code
5 relating to obtaining, modifying or administering public contracts or price agreements.

6 (z) “Public Contracting Code” or “code” means ORS chapters 279A, 279B and 279C.

7 (aa) “Public improvement” means a project for construction, reconstruction or major renovation
8 on real property by or for a contracting agency. “Public improvement” does not include:

9 (A) Projects for which no funds of a contracting agency are directly or indirectly used, except
10 for participation that is incidental or related primarily to project design or inspection; or

11 (B) Emergency work, minor alteration, ordinary repair or maintenance necessary to preserve a
12 public improvement.

13 (bb) “Public improvement contract” means a public contract for a public improvement. “Public
14 improvement contract” does not include a public contract for emergency work, minor alterations,
15 or ordinary repair or maintenance necessary to preserve a public improvement.

16 (cc) “Recycled material” means any material that would otherwise be a useless, unwanted or
17 discarded material except for the fact that the material still has useful physical or chemical prop-
18 erties after serving a specific purpose and can, therefore, be reused or recycled.

19 (dd) “Recycled oil” means used oil that has been prepared for reuse as a petroleum product by
20 refining, rerefining, reclaiming, reprocessing or other means, provided that the preparation or use
21 is operationally safe, environmentally sound and complies with all laws and regulations.

22 (ee) “Recycled paper” means a paper product with not less than:

23 (A) Fifty percent of its fiber weight consisting of secondary waste materials; or

24 (B) Twenty-five percent of its fiber weight consisting of post-consumer waste.

25 (ff) “Recycled PETE” means post-consumer polyethylene terephthalate material.

26 (gg) “Recycled product” means all materials, goods and supplies, not less than 50 percent of the
27 total weight of which consists of secondary and post-consumer waste with not less than 10 percent
28 of its total weight consisting of post-consumer waste. “Recycled product” includes any product that
29 could have been disposed of as solid waste, having completed its life cycle as a consumer item, but
30 otherwise is refurbished for reuse without substantial alteration of the product’s form.

31 (hh) “Secondary waste materials” means fragments of products or finished products of a manu-
32 facturing process that has converted a virgin resource into a commodity of real economic value.
33 “Secondary waste materials” includes post-consumer waste. “Secondary waste materials” does not
34 include excess virgin resources of the manufacturing process. For paper, “secondary waste
35 materials” does not include fibrous waste generated during the manufacturing process such as fibers
36 recovered from waste water or trimmings of paper machine rolls, mill broke, wood slabs, chips,
37 sawdust or other wood residue from a manufacturing process.

38 (ii) “Special government body” has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.117.

39 (jj) “State agency” means the executive department, except the Secretary of State and the State
40 Treasurer in the performance of the duties of their constitutional offices.

41 (kk) “State contracting agency” means an executive department entity authorized by law to
42 conduct a procurement.

43 (LL) “State government” has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.111.

44 (mm) “Used oil” has the meaning given that term in ORS 459A.555.

45 (nn) “Virgin oil” means oil that has been refined from crude oil and that has not been used or

1 contaminated with impurities.

38 279A.020. (1) Except as otherwise provided in the Public Contracting Code, all public contract-
39 ing by a contracting agency is subject to this chapter.

40 (2) **Except as provided in ORS 279C.320**, public contracting involving public improvements and
41 other construction services is subject to this chapter and ORS chapter 279C, but not ORS chapter
42 279B.

43 (3) Public contracting involving architects, engineers, land surveyors and related services is
44 subject to this chapter and ORS chapter 279C, but not ORS chapter 279B.

45 (4) **Except as provided in ORS 279C.320**, all other public contracting is subject to this chapter

1 and ORS 279B, but not ORS chapter 279C.

2 **SECTION 3.** ORS 279A.025 is amended to read:

3 279A.025. (1) Except as provided in subsections (2) to (4) of this section, the Public Contracting
4 Code applies to all public contracting.

5 (2) The Public Contracting Code does not apply to:

6 (a) Contracts between contracting agencies or between contracting agencies and the federal
7 government;

8 (b) Insurance and service contracts as provided for under ORS 414.115, 414.125, 414.135 and
9 414.145 for purposes of source selection;

10 (c) Grants;

11 (d) Contracts for professional or expert witnesses or consultants to provide services or testi-
12 mony relating to existing or potential litigation or legal matters in which a public body is or may
13 become interested;

14 (e) Acquisitions or disposals of real property or interest in real property;

15 (f) Sole-source expenditures when rates are set by law or ordinance for purposes of source se-
16 lection;

17 (g) Contracts for the procurement or distribution of textbooks;

18 (h) Procurements by a contracting agency from an Oregon Corrections Enterprises program;

19 (i) The procurement, transportation or distribution of distilled liquor, as defined in ORS 471.001,
20 or the appointment of agents under ORS 471.750 by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission;

21 (j) Contracts entered into under ORS chapter 180 between the Attorney General and private
22 counsel or special legal assistants;

23 *[(k) Contracts for the sale of forest products, as defined in ORS 321.005, from lands owned or

33 contracting for goods and services, as defined in ORS 279B.005, is subject to ORS chapter 279B;

34 (o) Contracts entered into by the State Treasurer in exercising the powers of that office pre-
35 scribed in ORS chapters 178, 286, 287, 288, 289, 293, 294 and 295, including but not limited to in-
36 vestment contracts and agreements, banking services, clearing house services and collateralization
37 agreements, bond documents, certificates of participation and other debt repayment agreements, and
38 any associated contracts, agreements and documents, regardless of whether the obligations that the
39 contracts, agreements or documents establish are general, special or limited, except that the State
40 Treasurer's public contracting for goods and services, as defined in ORS 279B.005, is subject to ORS
41 chapter 279B;

42 *[(p) Energy savings performance contracts;]*

43 *[(q)]* (p) Contracts, agreements or other documents entered into, issued or established in con-
44 nection with:

45 (A) The incurring of debt by a public body, including but not limited to the issuance of bonds,

1 certificates of participation and other debt repayment obligations, and any associated contracts,
2 agreements or other documents, regardless of whether the obligations that the contracts, agreements
3 or other documents establish are general, special or limited;

4 (B) The making of program loans and similar extensions or advances of funds, aid or assistance
5 by a public body to a public or private body for the purpose of carrying out, promoting or sustaining
6 activities or programs authorized by law; or

7 (C) The investment of funds by a public body as authorized by law, and other financial trans-
8 actions of a public body that by their character cannot practically be established under the com-
9 petitive contractor selection procedures of ORS 279B.050 to 279B.085;

10 [(r)] (q) Contracts for employee benefit plans as provided in ORS 243.105 (1), 243.125 (4), 243.221,
11 243.275, 243.291, 243.303 and 243.565; or

12 [(s)] (r) Any other public contracting of a public body specifically exempted from the code by
13 another provision of law.

14 (3) The Public Contracting Code does not apply to the public contracting activities of:

15 (a) The Oregon State Lottery Commission;

16 (b) The Oregon University System and member institutions, except as provided in ORS 351.086;

17 (c) The legislative department;

18 (d) The judicial department;

19 (e) Semi-independent state agencies listed in ORS 182.451, 182.452 and 182.454, except as pro-
20 vided in ORS 279.835 to 279.855 and 279A.250 to 279A.290;

21 (f) Oregon Corrections Enterprises;

22 (g) The Oregon Film and Video Office, except as provided in ORS 279A.100 and 279A.250 to
23 279A.290;

24 (h) The Travel Information Council, except as provided in ORS 279A.250 to 279A.290;

25 (i) The Appraiser Certification and Licensure Board, except as provided in ORS 279.835 to
26 279.855 and 279A.250 to 279A.290; or

27 (j) Any other public body specifically exempted from the code by another provision of law.

29 qualified nonprofit agencies providing employment opportunities for disabled individuals under ORS

31 **SECTION 4.** ORS 279A.055 is amended to read:

32 279A.055. (1) Except as provided in ORS 279A.140, a contracting agency may enter into personal
33 services contracts. The provisions of this section do not relieve a contracting agency of the duty to
34 comply with ORS 279A.140, any other law applicable to state agencies or applicable city or county
35 charter provisions.

36 (2) **A state contracting agency with procurement authority under ORS 279A.050** or a local
37 contract review board by ordinance, resolution, administrative rule or other regulation may desig-
38 nate certain service contracts or classes of service contracts as personal services contracts.

39 **SECTION 5.** ORS 279A.105 is amended to read:

40 279A.105. (1) A contracting agency may require a contractor to subcontract some part of a
41 contract to, or to obtain materials to be used in performing the contract from, a business enterprise
42 that is certified under ORS 200.055 as an emerging small business.

43 (2) A contracting agency may require a contractor to subcontract some part of a contract to,
44 or to obtain materials to be used in performing the contract from, a business enterprise that is
45 certified under ORS 200.055 as an emerging small business and that, as identified by the contracting

1 agency, is located in or draws its workforce from economically [*depressed*] **distressed** areas, as
2 designated by the Economic and Community Development Department.

3 (3) A contracting agency may require that a public contract be awarded to a responsible bidder,
4 as defined in ORS 200.005, who the contracting agency determines has made good faith efforts as
5 prescribed in ORS 200.045 (3). For purposes of this subsection, “responsible bidder” includes a re-
6 sponsible proposer that has made good faith efforts as prescribed in ORS 200.045 (3).

7 **SECTION 6.** ORS 279A.205 is amended to read:

8 279A.205. (1) A contracting agency may participate in, sponsor, conduct or administer a **joint**
9 cooperative procurement for the procurement of any goods, services or public improvements.

10 (2) **A contracting agency may participate in, sponsor, conduct or administer a permissive**
11 **or interstate cooperative procurement for the procurement of any goods or services, but not**
12 **public improvements.**

13 **SECTION 7.** ORS 279B.005 is amended to read:

14 279B.005. (1) As used in this chapter, unless the context or a specifically applicable definition
15 requires otherwise:

16 [(a) “Established catalog price” means the price included in a catalog, price list, schedule or other
17 form that:]

18 [(A) Is regularly maintained by a manufacturer or contractor;]

19 [(B) Is either published or otherwise available for inspection by customers; and]

20 [(C) States prices at which sales are currently or were last made to a significant number of any
21 category of buyers or to buyers constituting the general market, including public bodies, for the goods
22 or services involved.]

23 [(b)] (a) “Goods and services” or “goods or services” means supplies, equipment, materials and
24 services other than personal services designated under ORS 279A.055 and any personal property,
25 including any tangible, intangible and intellectual property and rights and licenses in relation
26 thereto, that a contracting agency is authorized by law to procure. “Goods and services” or “goods
27 or services” includes combinations of any of the items identified in this paragraph.

28 [(c)] (b) “Invitation to bid” means all documents, whether attached or incorporated by reference,
29 used for soliciting bids.

30 [(d)] (c) “Procurement description” means the words used in a solicitation to describe the goods
31 or services to be procured. “Procurement description” includes specifications attached to or made
32 a part of the solicitation.

33 [(e)] (d) “Public contract for goods or services” includes, for state **contracting** agencies **with**
34 **procurement authority under ORS 279A.050**, contracts for personal services as designated [*under*
35 *ORS 279A.055*] **by the state contracting agencies.**

36 [(f)] (e) “Request for proposals” means all documents, whether attached or incorporated by ref-
37 erence, used for soliciting proposals.

38 [(g)] (f) “Responsible bidder” or “responsible proposer” means a person who meets the standards
39 of responsibility described in ORS 279B.110.

16 contract is to be awarded, the contracting agency shall award the contract to the lowest responsible
17 bidder.

18 (2) At least seven days before the award of a public improvement contract, unless the con-
19 tracting agency determines that seven days is impractical under rules adopted under ORS 279A.065,
20 the contracting agency shall issue to each bidder or post, electronically or otherwise, a notice of
21 the contracting agency's intent to award a contract. This subsection does not apply to a contract
22 excepted or exempted from competitive bidding under ORS 279C.335 (1)(c) [*or (d)*] or (6). The notice
23 and its manner of posting or issuance must conform to rules adopted under ORS 279A.065.

24 (3) In determining the lowest responsible bidder, a contracting agency shall:

25 (a) Check the list created by the Construction Contractors Board under ORS 701.227 for bidders
26 who are not qualified to hold a public improvement contract; and

27 (b) Determine whether the prospective bidder has met the standards of responsibility. In making
28 the determination, the contracting agency shall consider whether a prospective bidder has:

29 (A) Available the appropriate financial, material, equipment, facility and personnel resources
30 and expertise, or the ability to obtain the resources and expertise, necessary to indicate the capa-
31 bility of the prospective bidder to meet all contractual responsibilities;

32 (B) A satisfactory record of performance. The contracting agency shall document the record of
33 performance of a prospective bidder if the contracting agency finds the prospective bidder not to
34 be responsible under this subparagraph;

35 (C) A satisfactory record of integrity. The contracting agency shall document the record of in-
36 tegrity of a prospective bidder if the contracting agency finds the prospective bidder not to be re-
37 sponsible under this subparagraph;

38 (D) Qualified legally to contract with the contracting agency; and

39 (E) Supplied all necessary information in connection with the inquiry concerning responsibility.
40 If a prospective bidder fails to promptly supply information requested by the contracting agency
41 concerning responsibility, the contracting agency shall base the determination of responsibility upon
42 any available information, or may find the prospective bidder not to be responsible.

43 (4) The successful bidder shall:

44 (a) Promptly execute a formal contract; and

45 (b) Execute and deliver to the contracting agency a performance bond and a payment bond when

1 required under ORS 279C.380.

10 performance of the contract in accordance with the plans, specifications and conditions of the con-
11 tract. The performance bond must be solely for the protection of the contracting agency that
12 awarded the contract and any public agency or agencies for whose benefit the contract was
13 awarded. If the public improvement contract is with a single person to provide both design and
14 construction of a public improvement, the obligation of the performance bond for the faithful per-
15 formance of the contract required by this paragraph must also be for the preparation and completion
16 of the design and related services covered under the contract. Notwithstanding when a cause of
17 action, claim or demand accrues or arises, the surety is not liable after final completion of the
18 contract, or longer if provided for in the contract, for damages of any nature, economic or otherwise
19 and including corrective work, attributable to the design aspect of a design-build project, or for the
20 costs of design revisions needed to implement corrective work. A contracting agency may waive the
21 requirement of a performance bond. A contracting agency may permit the successful bidder to sub-
22 mit a cashier's check or certified check in lieu of all or a portion of the required performance bond.

23 (b) A payment bond in an amount equal to the full contract price, solely for the protection of
24 claimants under ORS 279C.600.

25 (2) If the public improvement contract is with a single person to provide construction manager
26 and general contractor services, in which a guaranteed maximum price may be established by an
27 amendment authorizing construction period services following preconstruction period services, the
28 contractor shall provide the bonds required by subsection (1) of this section upon execution of an
29 amendment establishing the guaranteed maximum price. The contracting agency shall also require
30 the contractor to provide bonds equal to the value of construction services authorized by any early
31 work amendment in advance of the guaranteed maximum price amendment. Such bonds must be
32 provided before construction starts.

33 (3) Each performance bond and each payment bond must be executed solely by a surety company
34 or companies holding a certificate of authority to transact surety business in this state. The bonds

20 (b) Proposals are not required to be open for public inspection until after the notice of intent
21 to award a contract is issued.

22 (2) For each request for proposals, the contracting agency shall prepare a list of proposals.

23 (3) Notwithstanding any requirement to make proposals open to public inspection after the
24 contracting agency's issuance of notice of intent to award a contract, a contracting agency may
25 withhold from disclosure to the public trade secrets, as defined in ORS 192.501, and information

12 (8) If a public **improvement** contract is awarded, the contracting agency shall award a public
13 **improvement** contract to the responsible proposer whose proposal is determined in writing to be
14 the most advantageous to the contracting agency based on the evaluation factors set forth in the
15 request for proposals and, when applicable, the outcome of any negotiations authorized by the re-
16 quest for proposals. Other factors may not be used in the evaluation.

17 (9) The contracting agency may issue a request for information, a request for interest, a request
18 for qualifications or other preliminary documents to obtain information useful in the preparation or
19 distribution of a request for proposals.

20 **SECTION 25.** ORS 279C.430 is amended to read:

21 279C.430. (1) A contracting agency may adopt a rule, resolution, ordinance or other regulation
22 requiring mandatory prequalification for all persons desiring to bid for public improvement contracts
23 that are to be let by the agency. The rule, resolution, ordinance or other regulation authorized by
24 this section must include the time for submitting prequalification applications and a general de-

19 (d) Pay to the Department of Revenue all sums withheld from employees under ORS 316.167.

20 (2) In addition to the conditions specified in subsection (1) of this section, every public im-
21 provement contract shall contain a condition that the contractor shall demonstrate that an employee
22 drug testing program is in place.

23 **SECTION 28.** ORS 279C.515 is amended to read:

24 279C.515. (1) Every public **improvement** contract shall contain a clause or condition that, if the
25 contractor fails, neglects or refuses to make prompt payment of any claim for labor or services
26 furnished to the contractor or a subcontractor by any person in connection with the public **im-**
27 **provement** contract as the claim becomes due, the proper officer or officers representing the state
28 or a county, school district, municipality, municipal corporation or subdivision thereof, as the case
29 may be, may pay such claim to the person furnishing the labor or services and charge the amount
30 of the payment against funds due or to become due the contractor by reason of the contract.

7 son may not be employed for more than 10 hours in any one day, or 40 hours in any one week, ex-
8 cept in cases of necessity, emergency or when the public policy absolutely requires it, and in such
9 cases, except in cases of contracts for personal services [*designated under ORS 279A.055*] **as defined**
10 **in ORS 279C.100**, the employee shall be paid at least time and a half pay:

11 (a)(A) For all overtime in excess of eight hours in any one day or 40 hours in any one week
12 when the work week is five consecutive days, Monday through Friday; or

13 (B) For all overtime in excess of 10 hours in any one day or 40 hours in any one week when the
14 work week is four consecutive days, Monday through Friday; and

15 (b) For all work performed on Saturday and on any legal holiday specified in ORS 279C.540.

16 (2) An employer must give notice in writing to employees who work on a public contract, either
17 at the time of hire or before commencement of work on the contract, or by posting a notice in a

19 ployees may be required to work.

20 (3) In the case of contracts for personal services as [*described in ORS 279A.055*] **defined in ORS**
21 **279C.100**, the contract shall contain a provision that the employee shall be paid at least time and

7 **SECTION 31.** ORS 279C.540 is amended to read:

8 279C.540. (1) When labor is employed by the state or a county, school district, municipality,
9 municipal corporation or subdivision thereof through a contractor, a person may not be required or
10 permitted to labor more than 10 hours in any one day, or 40 hours in any one week, except in cases
11 of necessity or emergency or when the public policy absolutely requires it, in which event, the
12 person so employed for excessive hours shall receive at least time and a half pay:

13 (a)(A) For all overtime in excess of eight hours in any one day or 40 hours in any one week
14 when the work week is five consecutive days, Monday through Friday; or

15 (B) For all overtime in excess of 10 hours in any one day or 40 hours in any one week when the
16 work week is four consecutive days, Monday through Friday; and

17 (b) For all work performed on Saturday and on the following legal holidays:

18 (A) Each Sunday.

19 (B) New Year's Day on January 1.

20 (C) Memorial Day on the last Monday in May.

21 (D) Independence Day on July 4.

22 (E) Labor Day on the first Monday in September.

23 (F) Thanksgiving Day on the fourth Thursday in November.

24 (G) Christmas Day on December 25.

25 (2) An employer shall give notice in writing to employees who perform work under subsection
26 (1) of this section, either at the time of hire or before commencement of work on the contract, or
27 by posting a notice in a location frequented by employees, of the number of hours per day and days
28 per week that employees may be required to work.

29 (3) For the purpose of this section, each time a legal holiday, other than Sunday, listed in sub-
30 section (1) of this section falls on Sunday, the succeeding Monday shall be recognized as a legal
31 holiday. Each time a legal holiday listed in subsection (1) of this section falls on Saturday, the pre-
32 ceding Friday shall be recognized as a legal holiday.

33 (4) Subsections (1) [*and (2)*] **to (3)** of this section do not apply to a public improvement contract
34 or a contract for services if the contractor is a party to a collective bargaining agreement in effect
35 with any labor organization.

36 (5) When specifically agreed to under a written labor-management negotiated labor agreement,
37 an employee may be paid at least time and a half pay for work performed on any legal holiday
38 specified in ORS 187.010 and 187.020 that is not listed in subsection (1) of this section.

39 [(6) *This section does not apply to labor performed in the prevention or suppression of fire under*
40 *contracts and agreements made under the authority of the State Forester or the State Board of*
41 *Forestry, under ORS 477.406.*]

42 [(7)] (6) This section does not apply to contracts for personal services [*designated under ORS*
43 *279A.055*] **as defined in ORS 279C.100**, provided that persons employed under such contracts shall
44 receive at least time and a half pay for work performed on the legal holidays specified in subsection
45 (1)(b)(B) to (G) of this section and for all overtime worked in excess of 40 hours in any one week,

1 except for individuals under personal services contracts who are excluded under ORS 653.010 to
2 653.261 or under 29 U.S.C. 201 to 209 from receiving overtime.

3 [(8)] (7) Subsections (1) and (2) of this section do not apply to contracts for services at a county
4 fair or for other events authorized by a county fair board if persons employed under the contract
5 receive at least time and a half for work in excess of 10 hours in any one day or 40 hours in any
6 one week.

7 [(9)(a)] (8)(a) Subsections (1) and (2) of this section do not apply to contracts for services.
8 However, persons employed under such contracts shall receive at least time and a half pay for work
9 performed on the legal holidays specified in a collective bargaining agreement or in subsection
10 (1)(b)(B) to (G) of this section and for all time worked in excess of 10 hours in any one day or in
11 excess of 40 hours in any one week, whichever is greater.

12 (b) An employer shall give notice in writing to employees who work on a contract for services,
13 either at the time of hire or before commencement of work on the contract, or by posting a notice
14 in a location frequented by employees, of the number of hours per day and days per week that the
15 employees may be required to work.

16 [(10)] (9) Any contractor or subcontractor or contractor's or subcontractor's surety that violates
17 the provisions of this section is liable to the affected employees in the amount of their unpaid
18 overtime wages and in an additional amount equal to the unpaid overtime wages as liquidated
19 damages. If the violation results from willful falsification of payroll records, the contractor or sub-
20 contractor or contractor's or subcontractor's surety is liable to the affected employees in the
21 amount of their unpaid overtime wages and an additional amount equal to twice the unpaid overtime
22 wages as liquidated damages.

23 [(11)] (10) An action to enforce liability to employees under subsection [(10)] (9) of this section
24 may be brought as an action on the contractor's payment bond as provided for in ORS 279C.610.

25 [(12) *This section does not apply to financial institutions as defined in ORS 706.008.*]

26 [(13)] (11) In accordance with ORS chapter 183, the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and
27 Industries may adopt rules to carry out the provisions of this section.

28 **SECTION 32.** ORS 279C.550 is amended to read:

29 279C.550. As used in ORS 279C.550 to 279C.570, "retainage" means the difference between the
30 amount earned by a contractor on a public **improvement** contract and the amount paid on the
31 contract by the contracting agency.

32 **SECTION 33.** ORS 279C.570 is amended to read:

33 279C.570. (1) It is the policy of the State of Oregon that all payments due on a public improve-
34 ment contract and owed by a contracting agency shall be paid promptly. No contracting agency is
35 exempt from the provisions of this section.

36 (2) Contracting agencies shall make progress payments on the contract monthly as work
37 progresses on a public improvement contract. Payments shall be based upon estimates of work
38 completed that are approved by the contracting agency. A progress payment is not considered ac-
39 ceptance or approval of any work or waiver of any defects therein. The contracting agency shall
40 pay to the contractor interest on the progress payment, not including retainage, due the contractor.
41 The interest shall commence 30 days after receipt of the invoice from the contractor or 15 days after
42 the payment is approved by the contracting agency, whichever is the earlier date. The rate of in-
43 terest charged to the contracting agency on the amount due shall equal three times the discount
44 rate on 90-day commercial paper in effect at the Federal Reserve Bank in the Federal Reserve dis-
45 trict that includes Oregon on the date that is 30 days after receipt of the invoice from the con-

1 tractor or 15 days after the payment is approved by the contracting agency, whichever is the earlier
2 date, but the rate of interest may not exceed 30 percent.

3 (3) Interest shall be paid automatically when payments become overdue. The contracting agency
4 shall document, calculate and pay any interest due when payment is made on the principal. Interest
5 payments shall accompany payment of net due on public **improvement** contracts. The contracting
6 agency may not require the contractor to petition, invoice, bill or wait additional days to receive
7 interest due.

8 (4) When an invoice is filled out incorrectly, when there is any defect or impropriety in any
9 submitted invoice or when there is a good faith dispute, the contracting agency shall so notify the
10 contractor within 15 days stating the reason or reasons the invoice is defective or improper or the
11 reasons for the dispute. A defective or improper invoice, if corrected by the contractor within seven
12 days of being notified by the contracting agency, may not cause a payment to be made later than
13 specified in this section unless interest is also paid.

14 (5) If requested in writing by a first-tier subcontractor, the contractor, within 10 days after re-
15 ceiving the request, shall send to the first-tier subcontractor a copy of that portion of any invoice,
16 request for payment submitted to the contracting agency or pay document provided by the con-
17 tracting agency to the contractor specifically related to any labor or materials supplied by the
18 first-tier subcontractor.

19 (6) Payment of interest may be postponed when payment on the principal is delayed because of
20 disagreement between the contracting agency and the contractor. Whenever a contractor brings
21 formal administrative or judicial action to collect interest due under this section, the prevailing
22 party is entitled to costs and reasonable attorney fees.

23 (7) A contracting agency may reserve as retainage from any progress payment on a public **im-**
24 **provement** contract an amount not to exceed five percent of the payment. As work progresses, a
25 contracting agency may reduce the amount of the retainage and the contracting agency may elimi-
26 nate retainage on any remaining monthly contract payments after 50 percent of the work under the
27 contract is completed if, in the contracting agency's opinion, such work is progressing satisfactorily.
28 Elimination or reduction of retainage shall be allowed only upon written application by the con-
29 tractor, and the application shall include written approval of the contractor's surety. However, when
30 the contract work is 97.5 percent completed the contracting agency may, at the contracting agency's
31 discretion and without application by the contractor, reduce the retained amount to 100 percent of
32 the value of the contract work remaining to be done. Upon receipt of a written application by the
33 contractor, the contracting agency shall respond in writing within a reasonable time.

34 (8) The retainage held by a contracting agency shall be included in and paid to the contractor
35 as part of the final payment of the contract price. The contracting agency shall pay to the con-
36 tractor interest at the rate of 1.5 percent per month on the final payment due the contractor, in-
37 terest to commence 30 days after the work under the contract has been completed and accepted and
38 to run until the date when the final payment is tendered to the contractor. The contractor shall
39 notify the contracting agency in writing when the contractor considers the work complete and the
40 contracting agency shall, within 15 days after receiving the written notice, either accept the work
41 or notify the contractor of work yet to be performed on the contract. If the contracting agency does
42 not, within the time allowed, notify the contractor of work yet to be performed to fulfill contractual
43 obligations, the interest provided by this subsection shall commence to run 30 days after the end
44 of the 15-day period.

45 (9)(a) The contracting agency shall pay, upon settlement or judgment in favor of the contractor

1 regarding any dispute as to the compensation due a contractor for work performed under the terms
2 of a public **improvement** contract, the amount due plus interest at the rate of two times the dis-
3 count rate, but not to exceed 30 percent, on 90-day commercial paper in effect at the Federal Re-
4 serve Bank in the Federal Reserve district that includes Oregon on the date of the settlement or
5 judgment, and accruing from the later of:

6 (A) The due date of any progress payment received under the contract for the period in which
7 such work was performed; or

8 (B) Thirty days after the date on which the claim for the payment under dispute was presented
9 to the contracting agency by the contractor in writing or in accordance with applicable provisions
10 of the contract.

11 (b) Interest shall be added to and not made a part of the settlement or judgment.

12 **SECTION 34.** ORS 279C.580 is amended to read:

13 279C.580. (1) A contractor may not request payment from the contracting agency of any amount
14 withheld or retained in accordance with subsection (5) of this section until such time as the con-
15 tractor has determined and certified to the contracting agency that the subcontractor has deter-
16 mined and certified to the contracting agency that the subcontractor is entitled to the payment of
17 such amount.

18 (2) A dispute between a contractor and first-tier subcontractor relating to the amount or
19 entitlement of a first-tier subcontractor to a payment or a late payment interest penalty under a
20 clause included in the subcontract under subsection (3) or (4) of this section does not constitute a
21 dispute to which the contracting agency is a party. The contracting agency may not be included as
22 a party in any administrative or judicial proceeding involving such a dispute.

23 (3) Each public **improvement** contract awarded by a contracting agency shall include a clause
24 that requires the contractor to include in each subcontract for property or services entered into by
25 the contractor and a first-tier subcontractor, including a material supplier, for the purpose of per-
26 forming a construction contract:

27 (a) A payment clause that obligates the contractor to pay the first-tier subcontractor for satis-
28 factory performance under its subcontract within 10 days out of such amounts as are paid to the
29 contractor by the contracting agency under the contract; and

30 (b) An interest penalty clause that obligates the contractor, if payment is not made within 30
31 days after receipt of payment from the contracting agency, to pay to the first-tier subcontractor an
32 interest penalty on amounts due in the case of each payment not made in accordance with the
33 payment clause included in the subcontract under paragraph (a) of this subsection. A contractor or
34 first-tier subcontractor may not be obligated to pay an interest penalty if the only reason that the
35 contractor or first-tier subcontractor did not make payment when payment was due is that the
36 contractor or first-tier subcontractor did not receive payment from the contracting agency or con-
37 tractor when payment was due. The interest penalty shall be:

38 (A) For the period beginning on the day after the required payment date and ending on the date
39 on which payment of the amount due is made; and

40 (B) Computed at the rate specified in ORS 279C.515 (2).

41 (4) The contract awarded by the contracting agency shall require the contractor to include in
42 each of the contractor's subcontracts, for the purpose of performance of such contract condition, a
43 provision requiring the first-tier subcontractor to include a payment clause and an interest penalty
44 clause conforming to the standards of subsection (3) of this section in each of the first-tier subcon-
45 tractor's subcontracts and to require each of the first-tier subcontractor's subcontractors to include

1 such clauses in their subcontracts with each lower-tier subcontractor or supplier.

2 (5)(a) The clauses required by subsections (3) and (4) of this section are not intended to impair
3 the right of a contractor or a subcontractor at any tier to negotiate, and to include in the subcon-
4 tract, provisions that:

5 (A) Permit the contractor or a subcontractor to retain, in the event of a good faith dispute, an
6 amount not to exceed 150 percent of the amount in dispute from the amount due a subcontractor
7 under the subcontract without incurring any obligation to pay a late payment interest penalty, in
8 accordance with terms and conditions agreed to by the parties to the subcontract, giving such re-
9 cognition as the parties consider appropriate to the ability of a subcontractor to furnish a perform-
10 ance bond and a payment bond;

11 (B) Permit the contractor or subcontractor to make a determination that part or all of the sub-
12 contractor's request for payment may be withheld in accordance with the subcontract agreement;
13 and

14 (C) Permit such withholdings without incurring any obligation to pay a late payment interest
15 penalty if:

16 (i) A notice conforming to the standards of subsection (8) of this section has been previously
17 furnished to the subcontractor; and

18 (ii) A copy of any notice issued by a contractor under sub-subparagraph (i) of this subparagraph
19 has been furnished to the contracting agency.

20 (b) As used in this subsection, "good faith dispute" means a documented dispute concerning:

21 (A) Unsatisfactory job progress.

22 (B) Defective work not remedied.

23 (C) Third-party claims filed or reasonable evidence that claims will be filed.

24 (D) Failure to make timely payments for labor, equipment and materials.

25 (E) Damage to the prime contractor or subcontractor.

26 (F) Reasonable evidence that the subcontract cannot be completed for the unpaid balance of the
27 subcontract sum.

28 (6) If, after making application to a contracting agency for payment under a contract but before
29 making a payment to a subcontractor for the subcontractor's performance covered by such applica-
30 tion, a contractor discovers that all or a portion of the payment otherwise due the subcontractor is
31 subject to withholding from the subcontractor in accordance with the subcontract agreement, the
32 contractor shall:

33 (a) Furnish to the subcontractor a notice conforming to the standards of subsection (8) of this
34 section as soon as practicable upon ascertaining the cause giving rise to a withholding, but prior
35 to the due date for subcontractor payment;

36 (b) Furnish to the contracting agency, as soon as practicable, a copy of the notice furnished to
37 the subcontractor under paragraph (a) of this subsection;

38 (c) Reduce the subcontractor's progress payment by an amount not to exceed the amount spec-
39 ified in the notice of withholding furnished under paragraph (a) of this subsection;

40 (d) Pay the subcontractor as soon as practicable after the correction of the identified subcon-
41 tract performance deficiency;

42 (e) Make such payment within:

43 (A) Seven days after correction of the identified subcontract performance deficiency unless the
44 funds therefor must be recovered from the contracting agency because of a reduction under para-
45 graph (f)(A) of this subsection; or

1 (B) Seven days after the contractor recovers such funds from the contracting agency;
2 (f) Notify the contracting agency upon:
3 (A) Reduction of the amount of any subsequent certified application for payment; or
4 (B) Payment to the subcontractor of any withheld amounts of a progress payment, specifying:
5 (i) The amounts of the progress payments withheld under paragraph (a) of this subsection; and
6 (ii) The dates that such withholding began and ended; and
7 (g) Be obligated to pay to the contracting agency an amount equal to interest on the withheld
8 payments computed in the manner provided in ORS 279C.570 from the 11th day after receipt of the
9 withheld amounts from the contracting agency until:
10 (A) The day the identified subcontractor performance deficiency is corrected; or
11 (B) The date that any subsequent payment is reduced under paragraph (f)(A) of this subsection.
12 (7)(a) If a contractor, after making payment to a first-tier subcontractor, receives from a supplier
13 or subcontractor of the first-tier subcontractor a written notice asserting a deficiency in such first-
14 tier subcontractor's performance under the contract for which the contractor may be ultimately li-
15 able and the contractor determines that all or a portion of future payments otherwise due such
16 first-tier subcontractor is subject to withholding in accordance with the subcontract agreement, the
17 contractor may, without incurring an obligation to pay a late payment interest penalty under sub-
18 section (6)(e) of this section:
19 (A) Furnish to the first-tier subcontractor a notice conforming to the standards of subsection (8)
20 of this section as soon as practicable upon making such determination; and
21 (B) Withhold from the first-tier subcontractor's next available progress payment or payments an
22 amount not to exceed the amount specified in the notice of withholding furnished under subpara-
23 graph (A) of this paragraph.
24 (b) As soon as practicable, but not later than 10 days after receipt of satisfactory written no-
25 tification that the identified subcontract performance deficiency has been corrected, the contractor
26 shall pay the amount withheld under paragraph (a)(B) of this subsection to such first-tier subcon-
27 tractor, or shall incur an obligation to pay a late payment interest penalty to such first-tier sub-
28 contractor computed at the rate specified in ORS 279C.570.
29 (8) A written notice of any withholding shall be issued to a subcontractor, with a copy to the
30 contracting agency of any such notice issued by a contractor, specifying:
31 (a) The amount to be withheld;
32 (b) The specified causes for the withholding under the terms of the subcontract; and
33 (c) The remedial actions to be taken by the subcontractor in order to receive payment of the
34 amounts withheld.
35 (9) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, this section does not limit or impair any
36 contractual, administrative or judicial remedies otherwise available to a contractor or a subcon-
37 tractor in the event of a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by a contractor or deficient
38 performance or nonperformance by a subcontractor.
39 (10) A contractor's obligation to pay a late payment interest penalty to a subcontractor under

36 [(4)] (5) Grant easements, permits and licenses over, through and across the lands[; *also*]. **The**
 37 **State Forester** may require and collect reasonable fees or charges relating to the location and es-
 38 tablishment of easements, permits and licenses granted by the state over [*such lands, which*
 39 *moneys*] **the lands. The fees and charges collected** shall be used **exclusively** for the expenses of

41 (a) Execute any contracts or agreements necessary to create opportunities for the creation of
42 forestry carbon offsets; and

43 (b) Negotiate prices that are at, or greater than, fair market value for the transfer or sale of
44 forestry carbon offsets.

45 (8) Do all things and make all rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, necessary or

1 convenient for the management, protection, utilization and conservation of the lands.

2 (9) Require such undertakings as in the opinion of the State Forester are necessary or conven-
3 ient to secure performance of any agreement authorized in ORS 530.450 to 530.520.

4 **SECTION 39.** Section 336, chapter 794, Oregon Laws 2003, is amended to read:

5 **Sec. 336. (1)** Sections 1 to 21, 23 to 91, 94 to 103, 106 to 108, 111, 114 to 125 and 128 to 192,
6 **chapter 794, Oregon Laws 2003** [*of this 2003 Act*], the amendments to statutes and uncodified law
7 by sections 193 to 229 and 229b to 331d, **chapter 794, Oregon Laws 2003**, [*of this 2003 Act*] and the
8 repeal of statutes by section 332, **chapter 794, Oregon Laws 2003**, [*of this 2003 Act*] apply only to
9 public contracts first advertised, but if not advertised then entered into, on or after March 1, 2005.

10 **(2)(a) Statutes repealed by section 332, chapter 794, Oregon Laws 2003, and rules that**
11 **expire under or are repealed effective March 1, 2005, pursuant to section 334, chapter 794,**
12 **Oregon Laws 2003, continue to apply to public contracts, and to the solicitation of public**
13 **contracts, that are first advertised, but if not advertised then entered into, before March 1,**
14 **2005, to all protests concerning those solicitations, and to the judicial review of those solici-**
15 **itations and protests. However, an amendment or change to the work, made on or after**
16 **March 1, 2005, of a public contract must comply with those provisions of chapter 794, Oregon**
17 **Laws 2003, and rules adopted thereunder that govern the authority to make those amend-**
18 **ments or changes and that regulate those amendments or changes.**

19 **(b) As used in this subsection, "solicitation" means contracting processes that occur be-**
20 **fore contract formation.**

21 **SECTION 40.** This 2005 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public
22 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2005 Act takes effect
23 March 1, 2005.
