

SENATE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 2299

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “ORS” delete the rest of the line and line 3 and insert
2 “137.540, 144.102, 144.270, 181.585, 181.592, 181.594, 181.595, 181.596, 181.597, 181.599, 181.600,
3 181.607, 181.608 and 423.478 and section 23, chapter 626, Oregon Laws 1999.”.

4 On page 4, after line 45, insert:

5 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 181.594 is amended to read:

6 “181.594. As used in ORS 181.595, 181.596, 181.597 and 181.603:

7 “(1) ‘Attends’ means is enrolled on a full-time or part-time basis.

8 “[1)(a)] (2)(a) ‘Correctional facility’ means any place used for the confinement of persons:

9 “(A) Charged with or convicted of a crime or otherwise confined under a court order.

10 “(B) Found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for having committed an act that
11 if committed by an adult would constitute a crime.

12 “(b) ‘Correctional facility’ applies to a state hospital only as to persons detained therein charged
13 with or convicted of a crime, or detained therein after being found guilty except for insanity under
14 ORS 161.290 to 161.370.

15 “(3) ‘Institution of higher education’ means a public or private educational institution
16 that provides a program of post-secondary education.

17 “[2)] (4) ‘Sex crime’ means:

18 “(a) Rape in any degree;

19 “(b) Sodomy in any degree;

20 “(c) Unlawful sexual penetration in any degree;

21 “(d) Sexual abuse in any degree;

22 “(e) Incest with a child victim;

23 “(f) Using a child in a display of sexually explicit conduct;

24 “(g) Encouraging child sexual abuse in any degree;

25 “(h) Transporting child pornography into the state [(1993 Edition)];

26 “(i) Paying for viewing a child’s sexually explicit conduct [(1993 Edition)];

27 “(j) Compelling prostitution;

28 “(k) Promoting prostitution;

29 “(L) Kidnapping in the first degree if the victim was under 18 years of age;

30 “(m) Contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor;

31 “(n) Sexual misconduct if the offender is at least 18 years of age;

32 “(o) Possession of materials depicting sexually explicit conduct of a child in the first degree;

33 “(p) Kidnapping in the second degree if the victim was under 18 years of age, except by a parent
34 or by a person found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court;

35 “(q) Any attempt to commit any of the crimes set forth in paragraphs (a) to (p) of this sub-

1 section;

2 “(r) Burglary, when committed with intent to commit any of the offenses listed in paragraphs (a)
3 to (p) or (s) of this subsection; or

4 “(s) Public indecency or private indecency, if the person has a prior conviction for a crime listed
5 in paragraphs (a) to (r) of this subsection.

6 “[3] (5) ‘Sex offender’ means a person who:

7 “(a) Has been convicted of a sex crime;

8 “(b) Has been found guilty except for insanity of a sex crime;

9 “(c) Has been found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for having committed an
10 act that if committed by an adult would constitute a sex crime; or

11 “(d) Is paroled to this state under ORS 144.610 after being convicted in another jurisdiction of
12 a crime that would constitute a sex crime if committed in this state.

13 “(6) **‘Works’ or ‘carries on a vocation’ means full-time or part-time employment for more
14 than 14 days within one calendar year whether financially compensated, volunteered or for
15 the purpose of governmental or educational benefit.**

16 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 181.595 is amended to read:

17 “181.595. (1)(a) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the agency or
18 official to whom a person reports under subsection (3) of this section shall complete a sex offender
19 registration form concerning the person when the person reports under subsection (3) of this section.

20 “(b) When a person who is under supervision reports to the agency supervising the person, the
21 supervising agency may require the person to report instead to the Department of State Police, a
22 chief of police or a county sheriff and provide the supervising agency with proof of the completed
23 registration.

24 “(2) Subsection (3) of this section applies to a person who:

25 “(a) Is discharged, paroled or released on any form of supervised or conditional release from a
26 jail, prison or other correctional facility or detention facility in this state at which the person was
27 confined as a result of:

28 “(A) Conviction of a sex crime;

29 “(B) Having been found guilty except for insanity of a sex crime; or

30 “(C) Having been found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for having committed
31 an act that if committed by an adult would constitute a sex crime;

32 “(b) Is paroled to this state under ORS 144.610 after being convicted in another jurisdiction of
33 a crime that would constitute a sex crime if committed in this state;

34 “(c) Is paroled to or otherwise placed in this state after having been found by a court in another
35 jurisdiction to have committed an act while the person was under 18 years of age that would con-
36 stitute a sex crime if committed in this state by an adult; or

37 “(d) Is discharged by the court under ORS 161.329 after having been found guilty except for in-
38 sanity of a sex crime.

39 “(3)(a) Within 10 days following discharge, release on parole, post-prison supervision or other
40 supervised or conditional release, the person shall report, in person, to the Department of State
41 Police, a chief of police or a county sheriff or to the supervising agency, if any.

42 “(b) **[Thereafter] After making the report required by paragraph (a) of this subsection,** the
43 person shall report, in person:

44 “(A) Within 10 days of a change of residence; *[and]*

45 “(B) Once each year within 10 days of the person’s birth date, regardless of whether the person

1 changed residence;

2 **“(C) Within 10 days of the first day the person works at, carries on a vocation at or at-**
3 **tends an institution of higher education; and**

4 **“(D) Within 10 days of a change in work, vocation or attendance status at an institution**
5 **of higher education.**

6 “[*(b)*] (c) The person shall make the reports required by paragraph [*(a)(A) and (B)*] (b) of this
7 subsection to the department, a chief of police, a county sheriff or the supervising agency, if any.

8 “[*(c)*] (d) If the person required to report under this subsection is a youth offender, as defined
9 in ORS 419A.004, who is under supervision, the person shall make the reports required by [*para-*
10 *graph (a)*] **paragraphs (a) and (b)** of this subsection to the agency supervising the person.

11 “[*(d)*] (e) The obligation to report under this [*section*] **subsection** terminates if the conviction
12 or adjudication that gave rise to the obligation is reversed or vacated or if the registrant is par-
13 doned.

14 “(4) As part of the registration requirement under this section, the Department of State Police,
15 the chief of police, the county sheriff or the supervising agency:

16 “(a) Shall photograph the person and obtain the signature of the person; and

17 “(b) May fingerprint the person.

18 **“SECTION 7.** ORS 181.596 is amended to read:

19 “181.596. (1)(a) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the agency or
20 official to whom a person reports under subsection (4) of this section shall complete a sex offender
21 registration form concerning the person when the person reports under subsection (4) of this section.

22 “(b) When a person who is under supervision reports to the agency supervising the person, the
23 supervising agency may require the person to report instead to the Department of State Police, a
24 chief of police or a county sheriff and provide the supervising agency with proof of the completed
25 registration.

26 “(2) Subsection (4) of this section applies to a person who is discharged, released or placed on
27 probation:

28 “(a) By the court after being convicted in this state of a sex crime;

29 “(b) By the juvenile court after being found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court
30 for having committed an act that if committed by an adult would constitute a sex crime;

31 “(c) To this state under ORS 144.610 after being convicted in another jurisdiction of a crime that
32 would constitute a sex crime if committed in this state; or

33 “(d) To this state after having been found by a court in another jurisdiction to have committed
34 an act while the person was under 18 years of age that would constitute a sex crime if committed
35 in this state by an adult.

36 “(3) The court shall ensure that the person completes a form that documents the person’s obli-
37 gation to report under ORS 181.595 or this section. No later than three working days after the
38 person completes the form required by this subsection, the court shall ensure that the form is sent
39 to the Department of State Police.

40 “(4)(a) Within 10 days following discharge or release, the person shall report, in person, to the
41 Department of State Police, chief of police or county sheriff or to the supervising agency, if any.

42 **“(b) [*Thereafter*] After making the report required by paragraph (a) of this subsection,** the
43 person shall report, in person:

44 “(A) Within 10 days of a change of residence; [*and*]

45 “(B) Once each year within 10 days of the person’s birth date, regardless of whether the person

1 changed residence;

2 **“(C) Within 10 days of the first day the person works at, carries on a vocation at or at-**
3 **tends an institution of higher education; and**

4 **“(D) Within 10 days of a change in work, vocation or attendance status at an institution**
5 **of higher education.**

6 “[*(b)*] (c) The person shall make the reports required by paragraph [*(a)*](A) and (B)] (b) of this
7 subsection to the department, a chief of police, a county sheriff or the supervising agency, if any.

8 “[*(c)*] (d) If the person required to report under this subsection is a youth offender, as defined
9 in ORS 419A.004, who is under supervision, the person shall make the reports required by [*para-*
10 *graph* (a)] **paragraphs (a) and (b)** of this subsection to the agency supervising the person.

11 “[*(d)*] (e) The obligation to report under this [*section*] **subsection** terminates if the conviction
12 or adjudication that gave rise to the obligation is reversed or vacated or if the registrant is par-
13 doned.

14 “(5) As part of the registration requirement under this section, the Department of State Police,
15 the chief of police, the county sheriff or the supervising agency:

16 “(a) Shall photograph the person and obtain the signature of the person; and

17 “(b) May fingerprint the person.

18 **“SECTION 8.** ORS 137.540 is amended to read:

19 “137.540. (1) The court may sentence the defendant to probation, which shall be subject to the
20 following general conditions unless specifically deleted by the court. The probationer shall:

21 “(a) Pay supervision fees, fines, restitution or other fees ordered by the court.

22 “(b) Not use or possess controlled substances except pursuant to a medical prescription.

23 “(c) Submit to testing of breath or urine for controlled substance or alcohol use if the
24 probationer has a history of substance abuse or if there is a reasonable suspicion that the
25 probationer has illegally used controlled substances.

26 “(d) Participate in a substance abuse evaluation as directed by the supervising officer and follow
27 the recommendations of the evaluator if there are reasonable grounds to believe there is a history
28 of substance abuse.

29 “(e) Remain in the State of Oregon until written permission to leave is granted by the Depart-
30 ment of Corrections or a county community corrections agency.

31 “(f) If physically able, find and maintain gainful full-time employment, approved schooling, or a
32 full-time combination of both. Any waiver of this requirement must be based on a finding by the
33 court stating the reasons for the waiver.

34 “(g) Change neither employment nor residence without prior permission from the Department
35 of Corrections or a county community corrections agency.

36 “(h) Permit the probation officer to visit the probationer or the probationer’s work site or resi-
37 dence and to conduct a walk-through of the common areas and of the rooms in the residence occu-
38 pied by or under the control of the probationer.

39 “(i) Consent to the search of person, vehicle or premises upon the request of a representative
40 of the supervising officer if the supervising officer has reasonable grounds to believe that evidence
41 of a violation will be found, and submit to fingerprinting or photographing, or both, when requested
42 by the Department of Corrections or a county community corrections agency for supervision pur-
43 poses.

44 “(j) Obey all laws, municipal, county, state and federal.

45 “(k) Promptly and truthfully answer all reasonable inquiries by the Department of Corrections

1 or a county community corrections agency.

2 “(L) Not possess weapons, firearms or dangerous animals.

3 “(m) If under supervision for, or previously convicted of, a sex offense under ORS 163.305 to
4 163.467, and if recommended by the supervising officer, successfully complete a sex offender treat-
5 ment program approved by the supervising officer and submit to polygraph examinations at the di-
6 rection of the supervising officer.

7 “(n) Participate in a mental health evaluation as directed by the supervising officer and follow
8 the recommendation of the evaluator.

9 “(o) Report as required and abide by the direction of the supervising officer.

10 “(p) If required to report as a sex offender under ORS 181.596, report with the Department of
11 State Police, a chief of police, a county sheriff or the supervising agency:

12 “(A) When supervision begins;

13 “(B) Within 10 days of a change in residence; *[and]*

14 “(C) Once each year within 10 days of the probationer’s date of birth;

15 “(D) **Within 10 days of the first day the person works at, carries on a vocation at or at-**
16 **tends an institution of higher education; and**

17 “(E) **Within 10 days of a change in work, vocation or attendance status at an institution**
18 **of higher education.**

19 “(2) In addition to the general conditions, the court may impose any special conditions of pro-
20 bation that are reasonably related to the crime of conviction or the needs of the defendant for the
21 protection of the public or reformation of the offender, or both, including, but not limited to, that
22 the probationer shall:

23 “(a) For crimes committed prior to November 1, 1989, and misdemeanors committed on or after
24 November 1, 1989, be confined to the county jail or be restricted to the probationer’s own residence
25 or to the premises thereof, or be subject to any combination of such confinement and restriction,
26 such confinement or restriction or combination thereof to be for a period not to exceed one year
27 or one-half of the maximum period of confinement that could be imposed for the offense for which
28 the defendant is convicted, whichever is the lesser.

29 “(b) For felonies committed on or after November 1, 1989, be confined in the county jail, or be
30 subject to other custodial sanctions under community supervision, or both, as provided by rules of
31 the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

32 “(c) For crimes committed on or after December 5, 1996, sell any assets of the probationer as
33 specifically ordered by the court in order to pay restitution.

34 “(3) When a person who is a sex offender, as defined in ORS 181.594, is released on probation,
35 the Department of Corrections or the county community corrections agency, whichever is appropri-
36 ate, shall notify the chief of police, if the person is going to reside within a city, and the county
37 sheriff of the county in which the person is going to reside of the person’s release and the conditions
38 of the person’s release.

39 “(4) Failure to abide by all general and special conditions imposed by the court and supervised
40 by the Department of Corrections or a county community corrections agency may result in arrest,
41 modification of conditions, revocation of probation or imposition of structured, intermediate sanc-
42 tions in accordance with rules adopted under ORS 137.595.

43 “(5) The court may at any time modify the conditions of probation.

44 “(6) A court may not order revocation of probation as a result of the probationer’s failure to
45 pay restitution unless the court determines from the totality of the circumstances that the purposes

1 of the probation are not being served.

2 “(7) It [*shall not be*] **is not** a cause for revocation of probation that the probationer failed to
3 apply for or *accept* employment at any workplace where there is a labor dispute in progress. As used
4 in this subsection, ‘labor dispute’ has the meaning for that term provided in ORS 662.010.

5 “(8) **As used in this section, ‘attends,’ ‘institution of higher education,’ ‘works’ and ‘car-**
6 **ries on a vocation’ have the meanings given those terms in ORS 181.594.**

7 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 144.102 is amended to read:

8 “144.102. (1) The State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision or local supervisory au-
9 thority responsible for correctional services for a person shall specify in writing the conditions of
10 post-prison supervision imposed under ORS 144.096. A copy of the conditions shall be given to the
11 person upon release from prison or jail.

12 “(2) The board or the supervisory authority shall determine, and may at any time modify, the
13 conditions of post-prison supervision, which may include, among other conditions, that the person
14 shall:

15 “(a) Comply with the conditions of post-prison supervision as specified by the board or supervi-
16 sory authority.

17 “(b) Be under the supervision of the Department of Corrections and its representatives or other
18 supervisory authority and abide by their direction and counsel.

19 “(c) Answer all reasonable inquiries of the board, the department or the supervisory authority.

20 “(d) Report to the parole officer as directed by the board, the department or the supervisory
21 authority.

22 “(e) Not own, possess or be in control of any weapon.

23 “(f) Respect and obey all municipal, county, state and federal laws.

24 “(g) Understand that the board or supervisory authority may, at its discretion, punish violations
25 of post-prison supervision.

26 “(h) Attend a victim impact treatment session in a county that has a victim impact program. If
27 the board or supervisory authority requires attendance under this paragraph, the board or supervi-
28 sory authority may require the person, as an additional condition of post-prison supervision, to pay
29 a reasonable fee to the victim impact program to offset the cost of the person’s participation. The
30 board or supervisory authority shall not order a person to pay a fee in excess of \$5 under this
31 paragraph.

32 “(i) If required to report as a sex offender under ORS 181.595, report with the Department of
33 State Police, a chief of police, a county sheriff or the supervising agency:

34 “(A) When supervision begins;

35 “(B) Within 10 days of a change in residence; [*and*]

36 “(C) Once each year within 10 days of the person’s date of birth;

37 “(D) **Within 10 days of the first day the person works at, carries on a vocation at or at-**
38 **tends an institution of higher education; and**

39 “(E) **Within 10 days of a change in work, vocation or attendance status at an institution**
40 **of higher education.**

41 “(3)(a) The board or supervisory authority may establish special conditions as the board or su-
42 pervisory authority [*shall determine are*] **determines** necessary because of the individual circum-
43 stances of the person on post-prison supervision.

44 “(b) If the person is on post-prison supervision following conviction of a sex crime, as defined
45 in ORS 181.594, the board or supervisory authority shall include all of the following as special

1 conditions of the person's post-prison supervision:

2 "(A) Agreement to comply with any curfew set by the board, the supervisory authority or the
3 supervising officer.

4 "(B) A prohibition against contacting a person under 18 years of age without the prior written
5 approval of the board, supervisory authority or supervising officer.

6 "(C) A prohibition against frequenting, without the prior written approval of the board, super-
7 visory authority or supervising officer, a place where persons under 18 years of age regularly con-
8 gregate.

9 "(D) A prohibition against working or volunteering at a school, [day] **child** care center, park,
10 playground or other place where persons under 18 years of age regularly congregate.

11 "(E) Entry into and completion of or successful discharge from a sex offender treatment program
12 approved by the board, supervisory authority or supervising officer. The program may include
13 polygraph and plethysmograph testing. The person is responsible for paying for the treatment pro-
14 gram.

15 "(F) A prohibition against any contact with the victim, directly or indirectly, unless approved
16 by the victim, the person's treatment provider and the board, supervisory authority or supervising
17 officer.

18 "(G) Unless otherwise indicated for the treatment required under subparagraph (E) of this par-
19 agraph, a prohibition against viewing, listening to, owning or possessing any sexually stimulating
20 visual or auditory materials that are relevant to the person's deviant behavior.

21 "(H) Agreement to consent to a search of the person or the vehicle or residence of the person
22 upon the request of a representative of the board or supervisory authority if the representative has
23 reasonable grounds to believe that evidence of a violation of a condition of post-prison supervision
24 will be found.

25 "(I) Participation in random polygraph examinations to obtain information for risk management
26 and treatment. The person is responsible for paying the expenses of the examinations. The results
27 of a polygraph examination under this subparagraph may not be used in evidence in a hearing to
28 prove a violation of post-prison supervision.

29 "(J) Maintenance of a driving log and a prohibition against driving a motor vehicle alone unless
30 approved by the board, supervisory authority or supervising officer.

31 "(K) A prohibition against using a post-office box unless approved by the board, supervisory
32 authority or supervising officer.

33 "(4)(a) The board or supervisory authority may require the person to pay, as a condition of
34 post-prison supervision, any compensatory fines, restitution or attorney fees:

35 "(A) As determined, imposed or required by the sentencing court; or

36 "(B) When previously required as a condition of any type of supervision that is later revoked.

37 "(b) The board may require a person to pay restitution as a condition of post-prison supervision
38 imposed for an offense other than the offense for which the restitution was ordered if the person:

39 "(A) Was ordered to pay restitution as a result of another conviction; and

40 "(B) Has not fully paid the restitution by the time the person has completed the period of post-
41 prison supervision imposed for the offense for which the restitution was ordered.

42 "(5) A person's failure to apply for or accept employment at any workplace where there is a
43 labor dispute in progress does not constitute a violation of the conditions of post-prison supervision.
44 As used in this subsection, 'labor dispute' has the meaning given that term in ORS 662.010.

45 "(6)(a) When a person is released from imprisonment on post-prison supervision, the board shall

1 order, as a condition of post-prison supervision, that the person reside for the first six months after
2 release in the county where the person resided at the time of the offense that resulted in the
3 imprisonment.

4 “(b) Upon motion of the board, the person, a victim or a district attorney, the board may waive
5 the residency requirement only after making a finding that one of the following conditions has been
6 met:

7 “(A) The person provides proof of employment with no set ending date in a county other than
8 the established county of residence;

9 “(B) The person is found to pose a significant danger to a victim of the person’s crime, or a
10 victim or victim’s family is found to pose a significant danger to the person residing in the estab-
11 lished county of residence;

12 “(C) The person has a spouse or biological or adoptive family residing in a county other than
13 the established county of residence who will be materially significant in aiding in the rehabilitation
14 of the person and in the success of the post-prison supervision;

15 “(D) As another condition of post-prison supervision, the person is required to participate in a
16 treatment program that is not available in the established county of residence;

17 “(E) The person desires to be released to another state; or

18 “(F) The board finds other good cause, of a nature similar to the other conditions listed in this
19 paragraph, for the waiver.

20 “(c)(A) The board shall determine the county where the person resided at the time of the offense
21 by establishing the person’s last address at the time of the offense. In making its determination, the
22 board shall examine all [*the available information in the following records*] **of the following:**

23 “(i) An Oregon driver license, regardless of its validity;

24 “(ii) Records maintained by the Department of Revenue;

25 “(iii) Records maintained by the Department of State Police Bureau of Criminal Identification;

26 “(iv) Records maintained by the Department of Human Services; [*or*] **and**

27 “(v) Records maintained by the Department of Corrections.

28 “(B) When the person did not have an identifiable address of record at the time of the offense,
29 the person is considered to have resided in the county where the offense occurred.

30 “(C) If the person is serving multiple sentences, the county of residence shall be determined
31 according to the date of the last arrest resulting in a conviction.

32 “(D) In determining the person’s county of residence for purposes of this subsection, the board
33 may not consider offenses committed by the person while the person was incarcerated in a Depart-
34 ment of Corrections facility.

35 “**(7) As used in this section, ‘attends,’ ‘institution of higher education,’ ‘works’ and ‘car-**
36 **ries on a vocation’ have the meanings given those terms in ORS 181.594.**

37 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 144.270 is amended to read:

38 “144.270. (1) The State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision, in releasing a person on
39 parole, shall specify in writing the conditions of the parole and a copy of such conditions shall be
40 given to the person paroled.

41 “(2) The board shall determine, and may at any time modify, the conditions of parole, which may
42 include, among other conditions, that the parolee shall:

43 “(a) Accept the parole granted subject to all terms and conditions specified by the board.

44 “(b) Be under the supervision of the Department of Corrections and its representatives and abide
45 by their direction and counsel.

1 “(c) Answer all reasonable inquiries of the board or the parole officer.
2 “(d) Report to the parole officer as directed by the board or parole officer.
3 “(e) Not own, possess or be in control of any weapon.
4 “(f) Respect and obey all municipal, county, state and federal laws.
5 “(g) Understand that the board may, in its discretion, suspend or revoke parole if it determines
6 that the parole is not in the best interest of the parolee, or in the best interest of society.
7 “(3)(a) The board may establish such special conditions as it [*shall determine*] **determines** are
8 necessary because of the individual circumstances of the parolee.
9 “(b) If the person is on parole following conviction of a sex crime, as defined in ORS 181.594,
10 the board shall include all of the following as special conditions of the person’s parole:
11 “(A) Agreement to comply with any curfew set by the board or the supervising officer.
12 “(B) A prohibition against contacting a person under 18 years of age without the prior written
13 approval of the board or supervising officer.
14 “(C) A prohibition against frequenting, without the prior written approval of the board or
15 supervising officer, a place where persons under 18 years of age regularly congregate.
16 “(D) A prohibition against working or volunteering at a school, [*day*] **child** care center, park,
17 playground or other place where persons under 18 years of age regularly congregate.
18 “(E) Entry into and completion of or successful discharge from a sex offender treatment program
19 approved by the board or supervising officer. The program may include polygraph and
20 plethysmograph testing. The person is responsible for paying for the treatment program.
21 “(F) A prohibition against any contact with the victim, directly or indirectly, unless approved
22 by the victim, the person’s treatment provider and the board or supervising officer.
23 “(G) Unless otherwise indicated for the treatment required under subparagraph (E) of this par-
24 agraph, a prohibition against viewing, listening to, owning or possessing any sexually stimulating
25 visual or auditory materials that are relevant to the person’s deviant behavior.
26 “(H) Agreement to consent to a search of the person or the vehicle or residence of the person
27 upon the request of a representative of the board if the representative has reasonable grounds to
28 believe that evidence of a violation of a condition of parole will be found.
29 “(I) Participation in random polygraph examinations to obtain information for risk management

42 “(7) **As used in this section, ‘attends,’ ‘institution of higher education,’ ‘works’ and ‘car-**
43 **ries on a vocation’ have the meanings given those terms in ORS 181.594.**

45 “181.599. (1) A person who is required to report as a sex offender and who has knowledge of the

1 reporting requirement commits the crime of failure to report as a sex offender if the person fails,
2 as required by ORS 181.595, 181.596 or 181.597, to:

3 “(a) Make the initial report to the appropriate agency or official;

4 “(b) **Report when the person works at, carries on a vocation at or attends an institution**
5 **of higher education;**

6 “[b] (c) Report following a change of residence, school enrollment or employment **status, in-**
7 **cluding enrollment, employment or vocation status at an institution of higher education;**

8 “[c] (d) Make an annual report; or

9 “[d] (e) Provide complete and accurate information.

10 “(2) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3) of this section, failure to report as a sex
11 offender is a Class A misdemeanor.

12 “(3) Failure to report as a sex offender is a Class C felony if the person violates:

13 “(a) Subsection (1)(a) of this section; or

14 “(b) Subsection (1)(b) **or (c)** of this section and the crime for which the person is required to

16 181.597.
