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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Requires person relieved of duty to report as sex offender to provide to Department of State Police copy of court order relieving person of duty.

Expands sex offender reporting requirements by requiring sex offender to report when sex offender works at, carries on vocation at or attends institution of higher education.

2 Relating to sex offender reporting; creating new provisions; and amending ORS 137.540, 144.102,
3 144.270, 181.585, 181.592, 181.594, 181.595, 181.596, 181.597, 181.599, 181.600, 181.607, 181.608 and
4 423.478 and section 23, chapter 626, Oregon Laws 1999.

5 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

6 **SECTION 1.** ORS 181.600 is amended to read:

7 181.600. (1)(a) No sooner than 10 years after termination of supervision on probation, conditional
8 release, parole or post-prison supervision, a person required to report under ORS 181.595, 181.596
9 or 181.597 may file a petition in the circuit court of the county in which the person resides for an
10 order relieving the person of the duty to report if:

11 (A) The person has only one conviction for, or juvenile court finding of jurisdiction based on,
12 a sex crime;

13 (B) The sex crime was a misdemeanor or Class C felony or, if committed in another state, would
14 have been a misdemeanor or Class C felony if committed in this state; and

15 (C) The person has not been determined to be a predatory sex offender as described in ORS
16 181.585.

17 (b) The district attorney of the county shall be named and served as the respondent in the pe-
18 tition.

19 (2) The court shall hold a hearing on the petition. In determining whether to grant the relief
20 requested, the court shall consider:

21 (a) The nature of the offense that required reporting;

22 (b) The age and number of victims;

23 (c) The degree of violence involved in the offense;

24 (d) Other criminal and relevant noncriminal behavior of the petitioner both before and after the
25 conviction that required reporting;

26 (e) The period of time during which the petitioner has not reoffended;

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (f) Whether the petitioner has successfully completed a court-approved sex offender treatment
2 program; and

3 (g) Any other relevant factors.

4 (3) If the court is satisfied by clear and convincing evidence that the petitioner is rehabilitated
5 and that the petitioner does not pose a threat to the safety of the public, the court shall enter an
6 order relieving the petitioner of the duty to report. **When the court enters an order under this**
7 **subsection, the petitioner shall send a certified copy of the court order to the Department**
8 **of State Police.**

9 **SECTION 2.** ORS 181.607 is amended to read:

10 181.607. (1)(a) No sooner than two years, but no later than five years, after the termination of
11 juvenile court jurisdiction over a person required to report under ORS 181.595, 181.596 or 181.597,
12 the person may file a petition for relief from the duty to report. The person must file the petition
13 in the juvenile court in which the person was adjudicated for the act that requires reporting.

14 (b) The juvenile court in which a petition under this section is filed may transfer the matter to
15 the juvenile court of the county that last supervised the person if the court determines that the
16 convenience of the parties, the victim and witnesses require the transfer.

17 (c) The juvenile court has exclusive original jurisdiction in any proceeding under this section.

18 (d) The person, the district attorney and the juvenile department are parties to a hearing on a
19 petition filed under this section.

20 (2) When a person files a petition under this section and the petition was filed:

21 (a) No later than three years after the termination of juvenile court jurisdiction, the state has
22 the burden of proving by clear and convincing evidence that the person is not rehabilitated and
23 continues to pose a threat to the safety of the public.

24 (b) More than three years, but no later than five years, after the termination of juvenile court
25 jurisdiction, the person has the burden of proving by clear and convincing evidence that the person
26 is rehabilitated and does not pose a threat to the safety of the public.

27 (3) In determining whether the state or the person has met the burden of proof established in
28 subsection (2) of this section, the juvenile court may consider but need not be limited to considering:

29 (a) The extent and impact of any physical or emotional injury to the victim;

30 (b) The nature of the act that subjected the person to the duty of reporting as a sex offender;

31 (c) Whether the person used or threatened to use force in committing the act;

32 (d) Whether the act was premeditated;

33 (e) Whether the person took advantage of a position of authority or trust in committing the act;

34 (f) The age of any victim at the time of the act, the age difference between any victim and the
35 person and the number of victims;

36 (g) The vulnerability of the victim;

37 (h) Other acts committed by the person that would be crimes if committed by an adult and
38 criminal activities engaged in by the person before and after the adjudication;

39 (i) Statements, documents and recommendations by or on behalf of the victim or the parents of
40 the victim;

41 (j) The person's willingness to accept personal responsibility for the act and personal account-
42 ability for the consequences of the act;

43 (k) The person's ability and efforts to pay the victim's expenses for counseling and other
44 trauma-related expenses or other efforts to mitigate the effects of the act;

45 (L) Whether the person has participated in and satisfactorily completed a sex offender treatment

1 program or any other intervention, and if so the juvenile court may also consider:

- 2 (A) The availability, duration and extent of the treatment activities;
- 3 (B) Reports and recommendations from the providers of the treatment;
- 4 (C) The person's compliance with court or supervision requirements regarding treatment; and
- 5 (D) The quality and thoroughness of the treatment program;
- 6 (m) The person's academic and employment history;
- 7 (n) The person's use of drugs or alcohol before and after the adjudication;
- 8 (o) The person's history of public or private indecency;
- 9 (p) The person's compliance with and success in completing the terms of supervision;
- 10 (q) The results of psychological examinations of the person;
- 11 (r) The protection afforded the public by the continued existence of the records; and
- 12 (s) Any other relevant factors.

13 (4) In a hearing under this section, the juvenile court may receive testimony, reports and other
14 evidence without regard to whether the evidence is admissible under ORS 40.010 to 40.210 and
15 40.310 to 40.585 if the evidence is relevant to the determination and findings required under this
16 section. As used in this subsection, "relevant evidence" has the meaning given that term in ORS
17 40.150.

18 (5) When a petition is filed under this section, the state has the right to have a psychosexual
19 evaluation of the person conducted. The state shall file notice with the juvenile court of its intention
20 to have the person evaluated. If the person objects to the evaluator chosen by the state, the juvenile
21 court for good cause shown may direct the state to select a different evaluator.

22 (6) As soon as practicable after a petition has been filed under this section, the district attorney
23 shall make a reasonable effort to notify the victim of the crime that the person has filed a petition
24 seeking relief under this section.

25 (7)(a) When a petition has been filed under this section and the petition was filed:

26 (A) No later than three years after the termination of juvenile court jurisdiction, the court shall
27 hold a hearing on the petition no sooner than 60 days and no later than 120 days after the date of
28 filing.

29 (B) More than three years, but no later than five years, after the termination of juvenile court
30 jurisdiction, the court shall hold a hearing no sooner than 90 days and no later than 150 days after
31 the date of filing.

32 (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, upon a showing of good cause, the court
33 may extend the period of time in which a hearing on the petition must be held.

34 (8) When the state has the burden of proof under subsection (2) of this section and proves by
35 clear and convincing evidence that the person is not rehabilitated and continues to pose a threat
36 to the safety of the public, the court shall deny the petition. When the person has the burden of
37 proof under subsection (2) of this section and proves by clear and convincing evidence that the
38 person is rehabilitated and does not pose a threat to the safety of the public, the court shall grant
39 the petition.

40 (9) When a juvenile court enters an order relieving a person of the requirement to report under
41 ORS 181.595, 181.596 or 181.597, the person [*is responsible for sending*] **shall send** a certified copy
42 of the juvenile court order to the Department of State Police.

43 (10) If a person commits an act that could be charged as a sex crime listed in ORS 137.707 and
44 the person is 15, 16 or 17 years of age at the time the act is committed, the state and the person
45 may stipulate that the person may not petition for relief under this section as part of an agreement

1 that the person be subject to the jurisdiction of the juvenile court rather than being prosecuted as
2 an adult under ORS 137.707.

3 **SECTION 3.** ORS 181.608 is amended to read:

4 181.608. (1) Except as provided in subsection (6) of this section, when a person is required to
5 report under ORS 181.595, 181.596 or 181.597 as a result of having been found in a juvenile adjudi-
6 cation in another jurisdiction to have committed an act while the person was under 18 years of age
7 that would constitute a sex crime if committed in this state by an adult, the person may file a pe-
8 tition in the circuit court of the county in which the person resides for an order relieving the person
9 of the duty to report if:

10 (a) The person has been registered as a sex offender in this state for at least two years;

11 (b) At least two years, but not more than five years, have elapsed since the termination of
12 supervision on probation or parole; and

13 (c) The person submits with the petition all releases and waivers necessary to allow the district
14 attorney for the county in which the petition is filed to obtain the following documents from the
15 jurisdiction in which the person was adjudicated for the sex crime:

16 (A) The juvenile court petition;

17 (B) The dispositional report to the court;

18 (C) The order of adjudication or jurisdiction;

19 (D) Any other relevant court documents;

20 (E) The police report relating to the sex crime for which reporting is required;

21 (F) The order terminating jurisdiction for the sex crime for which reporting is required; and

22 (G) The evaluation and treatment records or reports of the person that are related to the sex
23 crime for which reporting is required.

24 (2) A person filing a petition under this section has the burden of proving by clear and con-
25 vincing evidence that the person is rehabilitated and does not pose a threat to the safety of the
26 public.

27 (3) Unless the court finds good cause for a continuance, the court shall hold a hearing on the
28 petition no sooner than 90 days and no later than 150 days after the date the petition is filed.

29 (4) Notwithstanding subsection (1)(b) of this section, if a person has not been registered as a sex
30 offender in this state for two years until more than five years have elapsed since the termination
31 of supervision on probation or parole, the person may file a petition seeking relief under this section
32 if the person files the petition no later than 90 days after the date on which the person has been
33 registered as a sex offender in this state for two years.

34 (5) If a person who files a petition under this section is required to report as a sex offender for
35 having committed an act that if committed in this state could have subjected the person to prose-
36 cution as an adult under ORS 137.707, the court may not grant the petition notwithstanding the fact
37 that the person has met the burden of proof established in subsection (2) of this section unless the
38 court determines that to do so is in the interest of public safety.

39 (6) This section does not apply to a person who is required to register as a sex offender for life
40 in the jurisdiction in which the offense occurred.

41 (7) In a hearing under this section, the court may receive testimony, reports and other evidence
42 without regard to whether the evidence is admissible under ORS 40.010 to 40.210 and 40.310 to
43 40.585 if the evidence is relevant to the determination and findings required under this section. As
44 used in this subsection, "relevant evidence" has the meaning given that term in ORS 40.150.

45 **(8) If the court is satisfied by clear and convincing evidence that the person is rehabili-**

1 **tated and that the person does not pose a threat to the safety of the public, the court shall**
2 **enter an order relieving the person of the duty to report. When the court enters an order**
3 **under this subsection, the person shall send a certified copy of the court order to the De-**
4 **partment of State Police.**

5 **SECTION 4. The amendments to ORS 181.600, 181.607 and 181.608 by sections 1 to 3 of this**
6 **2005 Act apply to court orders entered on or after the effective date of this 2005 Act.**

7 **SECTION 5.** ORS 181.594 is amended to read:

8 181.594. As used in ORS 181.595, 181.596, 181.597 and 181.603:

9 **(1) “Attends” means is enrolled on a full-time or part-time basis.**

10 [(1)(a)] **(2)(a) “Correctional facility” means any place used for the confinement of persons:**

11 (A) Charged with or convicted of a crime or otherwise confined under a court order.

12 (B) Found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for having committed an act that
13 if committed by an adult would constitute a crime.

14 (b) “Correctional facility” applies to a state hospital only as to persons detained therein charged
15 with or convicted of a crime, or detained therein after being found guilty except for insanity under
16 ORS 161.290 to 161.370.

17 **(3) “Institution of higher education” means a public or private educational institution**
18 **that provides a program of post-secondary education.**

19 [(2)] **(4) “Sex crime” means:**

20 (a) Rape in any degree;

21 (b) Sodomy in any degree;

22 (c) Unlawful sexual penetration in any degree;

23 (d) Sexual abuse in any degree;

24 (e) Incest with a child victim;

25 (f) Using a child in a display of sexually explicit conduct;

26 (g) Encouraging child sexual abuse in any degree;

27 (h) Transporting child pornography into the state [(1993 Edition)];

28 (i) Paying for viewing a child’s sexually explicit conduct [(1993 Edition)];

29 (j) Compelling prostitution;

30 (k) Promoting prostitution;

31 (L) Kidnapping in the first degree if the victim was under 18 years of age;

32 (m) Contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor;

33 (n) Sexual misconduct if the offender is at least 18 years of age;

34 (o) Possession of materials depicting sexually explicit conduct of a child in the first degree;

35 (p) Kidnapping in the second degree if the victim was under 18 years of age, except by a parent
36 or by a person found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court;

37 (q) Any attempt to commit any of the crimes set forth in paragraphs (a) to (p) of this subsection;

38 (r) Burglary, when committed with intent to commit any of the offenses listed in paragraphs (a)
39 to (p) or (s) of this subsection; or

40 (s) Public indecency or private indecency, if the person has a prior conviction for a crime listed
41 in paragraphs (a) to (r) of this subsection.

42 [(3)] **(5) “Sex offender” means a person who:**

43 (a) Has been convicted of a sex crime;

44 (b) Has been found guilty except for insanity of a sex crime;

45 (c) Has been found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for having committed an

1 act that if committed by an adult would constitute a sex crime; or

2 (d) Is paroled to this state under ORS 144.610 after being convicted in another jurisdiction of a
3 crime that would constitute a sex crime if committed in this state.

4 **(6) “Works” or “carries on a vocation” means full-time or part-time employment for**
5 **more than 14 days within one calendar year whether financially compensated, volunteered**
6 **or for the purpose of governmental or educational benefit.**

7 **SECTION 6.** ORS 181.595 is amended to read:

8 181.595. (1)(a) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the agency or
9 official to whom a person reports under subsection (3) of this section shall complete a sex offender
10 registration form concerning the person when the person reports under subsection (3) of this section.

11 (b) When a person who is under supervision reports to the agency supervising the person, the
12 supervising agency may require the person to report instead to the Department of State Police, a
13 chief of police or a county sheriff and provide the supervising agency with proof of the completed
14 registration.

15 (2) Subsection (3) of this section applies to a person who:

16 (a) Is discharged, paroled or released on any form of supervised or conditional release from a
17 jail, prison or other correctional facility or detention facility in this state at which the person was
18 confined as a result of:

19 (A) Conviction of a sex crime;

20 (B) Having been found guilty except for insanity of a sex crime; or

21 (C) Having been found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for having committed
22 an act that if committed by an adult would constitute a sex crime;

23 (b) Is paroled to this state under ORS 144.610 after being convicted in another jurisdiction of a
24 crime that would constitute a sex crime if committed in this state;

25 (c) Is paroled to or otherwise placed in this state after having been found by a court in another
26 jurisdiction to have committed an act while the person was under 18 years of age that would con-
27 stitute a sex crime if committed in this state by an adult; or

28 (d) Is discharged by the court under ORS 161.329 after having been found guilty except for in-
29 sanity of a sex crime.

30 (3)(a) Within 10 days following discharge, release on parole, post-prison supervision or other
31 supervised or conditional release, the person shall report, in person, to the Department of State
32 Police, a chief of police or a county sheriff or to the supervising agency, if any.

33 **(b) [Thereafter] After making the report required by paragraph (a) of this subsection, the**
34 **person shall report, in person:**

35 (A) Within 10 days of a change of residence; *[and]*

36 (B) Once each year within 10 days of the person’s birth date, regardless of whether the person
37 changed residence;

38 **(C) Within 10 days of the first day the person works at, carries on a vocation at or at-**
39 **tends an institution of higher education; and**

40 **(D) Within 10 days of a change in work, vocation or attendance status at an institution**
41 **of higher education.**

42 *[(b)]* (c) The person shall make the reports required by paragraph *[(a)(A) and (B)]* (b) of this
43 subsection to the department, a chief of police, a county sheriff or the supervising agency, if any.

44 *[(c)]* (d) If the person required to report under this subsection is a youth offender, as defined in
45 ORS 419A.004, who is under supervision, the person shall make the reports required by *[paragraph*

1 (a)] **paragraphs (a) and (b)** of this subsection to the agency supervising the person.

2 [(d)] (e) The obligation to report under this [section] **subsection** terminates if the conviction or
3 adjudication that gave rise to the obligation is reversed or vacated or if the registrant is pardoned.

4 (4) As part of the registration requirement under this section, the Department of State Police,
5 the chief of police, the county sheriff or the supervising agency:

6 (a) Shall photograph the person and obtain the signature of the person; and

7 (b) May fingerprint the person.

8 **SECTION 7.** ORS 181.596 is amended to read:

9 181.596. (1)(a) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the agency or
10 official to whom a person reports under subsection (4) of this section shall complete a sex offender
11 registration form concerning the person when the person reports under subsection (4) of this section.

12 (b) When a person who is under supervision reports to the agency supervising the person, the
13 supervising agency may require the person to report instead to the Department of State Police, a
14 chief of police or a county sheriff and provide the supervising agency with proof of the completed
15 registration.

16 (2) Subsection (4) of this section applies to a person who is discharged, released or placed on
17 probation:

18 (a) By the court after being convicted in this state of a sex crime;

19 (b) By the juvenile court after being found to be within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court for
20 having committed an act that if committed by an adult would constitute a sex crime;

21 (c) To this state under ORS 144.610 after being convicted in another jurisdiction of a crime that
22 would constitute a sex crime if committed in this state; or

23 (d) To this state after having been found by a court in another jurisdiction to have committed
24 an act while the person was under 18 years of age that would constitute a sex crime if committed
25 in this state by an adult.

26 (3) The court shall ensure that the person completes a form that documents the person's obli-
27 gation to report under ORS 181.595 or this section. No later than three working days after the
28 person completes the form required by this subsection, the court shall ensure that the form is sent
29 to the Department of State Police.

30 (4)(a) Within 10 days following discharge or release, the person shall report, in person, to the
31 Department of State Police, chief of police or county sheriff or to the supervising agency, if any.

32 (b) [Thereafter] **After making the report required by paragraph (a) of this subsection**, the
33 person shall report, in person:

34 (A) Within 10 days of a change of residence; [and]

35 (B) Once each year within 10 days of the person's birth date, regardless of whether the person
36 changed residence;

37 (C) **Within 10 days of the first day the person works at, carries on a vocation at or at-**
38 **tends an institution of higher education; and**

39 (D) **Within 10 days of a change in work, vocation or attendance status at an institution**
40 **of higher education.**

41 [(b)] (c) The person shall make the reports required by paragraph [(a)(A) and (B)] (b) of this
42 subsection to the department, a chief of police, a county sheriff or the supervising agency, if any.

43 [(c)] (d) If the person required to report under this subsection is a youth offender, as defined in
44 ORS 419A.004, who is under supervision, the person shall make the reports required by [paragraph
45 (a)] **paragraphs (a) and (b)** of this subsection to the agency supervising the person.

1 [(d)] (e) The obligation to report under this [section] **subsection** terminates if the conviction or
2 adjudication that gave rise to the obligation is reversed or vacated or if the registrant is pardoned.

3 (5) As part of the registration requirement under this section, the Department of State Police,
4 the chief of police, the county sheriff or the supervising agency:

5 (a) Shall photograph the person and obtain the signature of the person; and

6 (b) May fingerprint the person.

7 **SECTION 8.** ORS 137.540 is amended to read:

8 137.540. (1) The court may sentence the defendant to probation, which shall be subject to the
9 following general conditions unless specifically deleted by the court. The probationer shall:

10 (a) Pay supervision fees, fines, restitution or other fees ordered by the court.

11 (b) Not use or possess controlled substances except pursuant to a medical prescription.

12 (c) Submit to testing of breath or urine for controlled substance or alcohol use if the probationer
13 has a history of substance abuse or if there is a reasonable suspicion that the probationer has ille-
14 gally used controlled substances.

15 (d) Participate in a substance abuse evaluation as directed by the supervising officer and follow
16 the recommendations of the evaluator if there are reasonable grounds to believe there is a history
17 of substance abuse.

18 (e) Remain in the State of Oregon until written permission to leave is granted by the Depart-
19 ment of Corrections or a county community corrections agency.

20 (f) If physically able, find and maintain gainful full-time employment, approved schooling, or a
21 full-time combination of both. Any waiver of this requirement must be based on a finding by the
22 court stating the reasons for the waiver.

23 (g) Change neither employment nor residence without prior permission from the Department of
24 Corrections or a county community corrections agency.

25 (h) Permit the probation officer to visit the probationer or the probationer's work site or resi-
26 dence and to conduct a walk-through of the common areas and of the rooms in the residence occu-
27 pied by or under the control of the probationer.

28 (i) Consent to the search of person, vehicle or premises upon the request of a representative of
29 the supervising officer if the supervising officer has reasonable grounds to believe that evidence of
30 a violation will be found, and submit to fingerprinting or photographing, or both, when requested
31 by the Department of Corrections or a county community corrections agency for supervision pur-
32 poses.

33 (j) Obey all laws, municipal, county, state and federal.

34 (k) Promptly and truthfully answer all reasonable inquiries by the Department of Corrections
35 or a county community corrections agency.

36 (L) Not possess weapons, firearms or dangerous animals.

37 (m) If under supervision for, or previously convicted of, a sex offense under ORS 163.305 to
38 163.467, and if recommended by the supervising officer, successfully complete a sex offender treat-
39 ment program approved by the supervising officer and submit to polygraph examinations at the di-
40 rection of the supervising officer.

41 (n) Participate in a mental health evaluation as directed by the supervising officer and follow
42 the recommendation of the evaluator.

43 (o) Report as required and abide by the direction of the supervising officer.

44 (p) If required to report as a sex offender under ORS 181.596, report with the Department of
45 State Police, a chief of police, a county sheriff or the supervising agency:

1 (A) When supervision begins;

2 (B) Within 10 days of a change in residence; [and]

3 (C) Once each year within 10 days of the probationer's date of birth;

4 **(D) Within 10 days of the first day the person works at, carries on a vocation at or at-**
5 **tends an institution of higher education; and**

6 **(E) Within 10 days of a change in work, vocation or attendance status at an institution**
7 **of higher education.**

8 (2) In addition to the general conditions, the court may impose any special conditions of pro-
9 bation that are reasonably related to the crime of conviction or the needs of the defendant for the
10 protection of the public or reformation of the offender, or both, including, but not limited to, that
11 the probationer shall:

12 (a) For crimes committed prior to November 1, 1989, and misdemeanors committed on or after
13 November 1, 1989, be confined to the county jail or be restricted to the probationer's own residence
14 or to the premises thereof, or be subject to any combination of such confinement and restriction,
15 such confinement or restriction or combination thereof to be for a period not to exceed one year
16 or one-half of the maximum period of confinement that could be imposed for the offense for which
17 the defendant is convicted, whichever is the lesser.

18 (b) For felonies committed on or after November 1, 1989, be confined in the county jail, or be
19 subject to other custodial sanctions under community supervision, or both, as provided by rules of
20 the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

21 (c) For crimes committed on or after December 5, 1996, sell any assets of the probationer as
22 specifically ordered by the court in order to pay restitution.

23 (3) When a person who is a sex offender, as defined in ORS 181.594, is released on probation,
24 the Department of Corrections or the county community corrections agency, whichever is appropri-
25 ate, shall notify the chief of police, if the person is going to reside within a city, and the county
26 sheriff of the county in which the person is going to reside of the person's release and the conditions
27 of the person's release.

28 (4) Failure to abide by all general and special conditions imposed by the court and supervised
29 by the Department of Corrections or a county community corrections agency may result in arrest,
30 modification of conditions, revocation of probation or imposition of structured, intermediate sanc-
31 tions in accordance with rules adopted under ORS 137.595.

32 (5) The court may at any time modify the conditions of probation.

33 (6) A court may not order revocation of probation as a result of the probationer's failure to pay
34 restitution unless the court determines from the totality of the circumstances that the purposes of
35 the probation are not being served.

36 (7) It [shall not be] **is not** a cause for revocation of probation that the probationer failed to apply

10 gave rise to the obligation is reversed or vacated or if the registrant is pardoned.

11 (2) Subsection (1) of this section applies to:

12 (a) A person convicted in another jurisdiction of a crime if the elements of the crime would
13 constitute a sex crime;

14 (b) A person found by a court in another jurisdiction to have committed an act while the person
15 was under 18 years of age that would constitute a sex crime if committed in this state by an adult;
16 and

17 (c) A person required to register in another state for having committed a sex offense in that
18 state regardless of whether the crime would constitute a sex crime in this state.

19 (3) As part of the registration required under this section, the Department of State Police, a city
20 police department or a sheriff’s office:

21 (a) Shall photograph the person and obtain the signature of the person; and

22 (b) May fingerprint the person.

23 **SECTION 16.** ORS 181.585 is amended to read:

24 181.585. (1) For purposes of ORS 181.585 to 181.587, a person is a predatory sex offender if the
25 person exhibits characteristics showing a tendency to victimize or injure others and has been con-
26 victed of a sex crime listed in ORS 181.594 [(2)(a)] (4)(a) to (d), has been convicted of attempting to
27 commit one of those crimes or has been found guilty except for insanity of one of those crimes.

28 (2) In determining whether a person is a predatory sex offender, an agency shall use a sex
29 offender risk assessment scale approved by the Department of Corrections or a community cor-
30 rections agency.

31 **SECTION 17.** The amendments to ORS 137.540, 144.102, 144.270, 181.592, 181.594, 181.595,
32 181.596, 181.599 and 423.478 by sections 5 to 13 of this 2005 Act apply to persons who are re-
33 quired to report as sex offenders on or after the effective date of this 2005 Act.
