SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Provides that home address, home telephone number and electronic mail address of public safety officer are exempt from disclosure **if requested by officer. Provides that exemption does not apply to certain records.**

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to public records; amending ORS 181.854 and 192.502.

3 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

4 **SECTION 1.** ORS 192.502 is amended to read:

5 192.502. The following public records are exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.410 to 192.505:

6 (1) Communications within a public body or between public bodies of an advisory nature to the
7 extent that they cover other than purely factual materials and are preliminary to any final agency
8 determination of policy or action. This exemption shall not apply unless the public body shows that
9 in the particular instance the public interest in encouraging frank communication between officials
10 and employees of public bodies clearly outweighs the public interest in disclosure.

11 (2) Information of a personal nature such as but not limited to that kept in a personal, medical
12 or similar file, if public disclosure would constitute an unreasonable invasion of privacy, unless the
13 public interest by clear and convincing evidence requires disclosure in the particular instance. The
14 party seeking disclosure shall have the burden of showing that public disclosure would not consti-
15 tute an unreasonable invasion of privacy.

16 (3) Public body employee or volunteer addresses, Social Security numbers, dates of birth and
17 telephone numbers contained in personnel records maintained by the public body that is the em-
18 ployer or the recipient of volunteer services. This exemption:

19 (a) Does not apply to the addresses, dates of birth and telephone numbers of employees or vol-
20 unteers who are elected officials, except that a judge or district attorney subject to election may
21 seek to exempt the judge's or district attorney's address or telephone number, or both, under the
22 terms of ORS 192.445;

23 (b) Does not apply to employees or volunteers to the extent that the party seeking disclosure
24 shows by clear and convincing evidence that the public interest requires disclosure in a particular
25 instance;

26 (c) Does not apply to a substitute teacher as defined in ORS 342.815 when requested by a pro-
27 fessional education association of which the substitute teacher may be a member; and

28 (d) Does not relieve a public employer of any duty under ORS 243.650 to 243.782.

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted.
New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (4) Information submitted to a public body in confidence and not otherwise required by law to
2 be submitted, where such information should reasonably be considered confidential, the public body
3 has obliged itself in good faith not to disclose the information, and when the public interest would
4 suffer by the disclosure.

5 (5) Information or records of the Department of Corrections, including the State Board of Parole
6 and Post-Prison Supervision, to the extent that disclosure would interfere with the rehabilitation of
7 a person in custody of the department or substantially prejudice or prevent the carrying out of the
8 functions of the department, if the public interest in confidentiality clearly outweighs the public in-
9 terest in disclosure.

10 (6) Records, reports and other information received or compiled by the Director of the Depart-
11 ment of Consumer and Business Services in the administration of ORS chapters 723 and 725 not
12 otherwise required by law to be made public, to the extent that the interests of lending institutions,
13 their officers, employees and customers in preserving the confidentiality of such information out-
14 weighs the public interest in disclosure.

15 (7) Reports made to or filed with the court under ORS 137.077 or 137.530.

16 (8) Any public records or information the disclosure of which is prohibited by federal law or
17 regulations.

18 (9) Public records or information the disclosure of which is prohibited or restricted or otherwise
19 made confidential or privileged under Oregon law.

20 (10) Public records or information described in this section, furnished by the public body ori-
21 ginally compiling, preparing or receiving them to any other public officer or public body in con-
22 nection with performance of the duties of the recipient, if the considerations originally giving rise
23 to the confidential or exempt nature of the public records or information remain applicable.

24 (11) Records of the Energy Facility Siting Council concerning the review or approval of security
25 programs pursuant to ORS 469.530.

26 (12) Employee and retiree address, telephone number and other nonfinancial membership records
27 and employee financial records maintained by the Public Employees Retirement System pursuant to
28 ORS chapters 238 and 238A.

29 (13) Records submitted by private persons or businesses to the State Treasurer or the Oregon
30 Investment Council relating to proposed acquisition, exchange or liquidation of public investments
31 under ORS chapter 293 may be treated as exempt from disclosure when and only to the extent that
32 disclosure of such records reasonably may be expected to substantially limit the ability of the
33 Oregon Investment Council to effectively compete or negotiate for, solicit or conclude such trans-
34 actions. Records which relate to concluded transactions are not subject to this exemption.

35 (14) The monthly reports prepared and submitted under ORS 293.761 and 293.766 concerning the
36 Public Employees Retirement Fund and the Industrial Accident Fund may be uniformly treated as
37 exempt from disclosure for a period of up to 90 days after the end of the calendar quarter.

38 (15) Reports of unclaimed property filed by the holders of such property to the extent permitted
39 by ORS 98.352.

40 (16) The following records, communications and information submitted to the Oregon Economic
41 and Community Development Commission, the Economic and Community Development Department,
42 the State Department of Agriculture, the Oregon Growth Account Board, the Port of Portland or
43 other ports, as defined in ORS 777.005, by applicants for investment funds, loans or services includ-
44 ing, but not limited to, those described in ORS 285A.224:

45 (a) Personal financial statements.

1 (b) Financial statements of applicants.

2 (c) Customer lists.

3 (d) Information of an applicant pertaining to litigation to which the applicant is a party if the
4 complaint has been filed, or if the complaint has not been filed, if the applicant shows that such
5 litigation is reasonably likely to occur; this exemption does not apply to litigation which has been
6 concluded, and nothing in this paragraph shall limit any right or opportunity granted by discovery
7 or deposition statutes to a party to litigation or potential litigation.

8 (e) Production, sales and cost data.

9 (f) Marketing strategy information that relates to applicant's plan to address specific markets
10 and applicant's strategy regarding specific competitors.

11 (17) Records, reports or returns submitted by private concerns or enterprises required by law
12 to be submitted to or inspected by a governmental body to allow it to determine the amount of any
13 transient lodging tax payable and the amounts of such tax payable or paid, to the extent that such
14 information is in a form which would permit identification of the individual concern or enterprise.
15 Nothing in this subsection shall limit the use which can be made of such information for regulatory
16 purposes or its admissibility in any enforcement proceedings. The public body shall notify the tax-
17 payer of the delinquency immediately by certified mail. However, in the event that the payment or
18 delivery of transient lodging taxes otherwise due to a public body is delinquent by over 60 days, the
19 public body shall disclose, upon the request of any person, the following information:

20 (a) The identity of the individual concern or enterprise that is delinquent over 60 days in the
21 payment or delivery of the taxes.

22 (b) The period for which the taxes are delinquent.

23 (c) The actual, or estimated, amount of the delinquency.

24 (18) All information supplied by a person under ORS 151.485 for the purpose of requesting ap-
25 pointed counsel, and all information supplied to the court from whatever source for the purpose of
26 verifying the financial eligibility of a person pursuant to ORS 151.485.

27 (19) Workers' compensation claim records of the Department of Consumer and Business Services,
28 except in accordance with rules adopted by the Director of the Department of Consumer and Busi-
29 ness Services, in any of the following circumstances:

30 (a) When necessary for insurers, self-insured employers and third party claim administrators to
31 process workers' compensation claims.

32 (b) When necessary for the director, other governmental agencies of this state or the United
33 States to carry out their duties, functions or powers.

34 (c) When the disclosure is made in such a manner that the disclosed information cannot be used
35 to identify any worker who is the subject of a claim.

36 (d) When a worker or the worker's representative requests review of the worker's claim record.

37 (20) Sensitive business records or financial or commercial information of the Oregon Health and
38 Science University that is not customarily provided to business competitors.

39 (21) Records of Oregon Health and Science University regarding candidates for the position of
40 president of the university.

41 (22) The records of a library, including circulation records, showing use of specific library ma-
42 terial by a named person or consisting of the name of a library patron together with the address
43 or telephone number, or both, of the patron.

44 (23) The following records, communications and information obtained by the Housing and Com-
45 munity Services Department in connection with the department's monitoring or administration of

1 financial assistance or of housing or other developments:

2 (a) Personal and corporate financial statements and information, including tax returns.

3 (b) Credit reports.

4 (c) Project appraisals.

5 (d) Market studies and analyses.

6 (e) Articles of incorporation, partnership agreements and operating agreements.

7 (f) Commitment letters.

8 (g) Project pro forma statements.

9 (h) Project cost certifications and cost data.

10 (i) Audits.

11 (j) Project tenant correspondence.

12 (k) Personal information about a tenant.

13 (L) Housing assistance payments.

14 (24) Raster geographic information system (GIS) digital databases, provided by private forestland
15 owners or their representatives, voluntarily and in confidence to the State Forestry Department,
16 that is not otherwise required by law to be submitted.

17 (25) Sensitive business, commercial or financial information furnished to or developed by a
18 public body engaged in the business of providing electricity or electricity services, if the information
19 is directly related to a transaction described in ORS 261.348, or if the information is directly related
20 to a bid, proposal or negotiations for the sale or purchase of electricity or electricity services, and
21 disclosure of the information would cause a competitive disadvantage for the public body or its re-
22 tail electricity customers. This subsection does not apply to cost-of-service studies used in the de-
23 velopment or review of generally applicable rate schedules.

24 (26) Sensitive business, commercial or financial information furnished to or developed by the
25 City of Klamath Falls, acting solely in connection with the ownership and operation of the Klamath
26 Cogeneration Project, if the information is directly related to a transaction described in ORS 225.085
27 and disclosure of the information would cause a competitive disadvantage for the Klamath
28 Cogeneration Project. This subsection does not apply to cost-of-service studies used in the develop-
29 ment or review of generally applicable rate schedules.

30 (27) Personally identifiable information about customers of a municipal electric utility or a
31 people's utility district. The utility or district may, however, release such information to a third
32 party if the customer consents in writing or electronically, if the disclosure is necessary to render
33 utility or district services to the customer, or if the disclosure is required pursuant to a court order.
34 The utility or district may charge as appropriate for the costs of providing such information. The
35 utility or district may make customer records available to third party credit agencies on a regular
36 basis in connection with the establishment and management of customer accounts or in the event
37 such accounts are delinquent.

38 (28) A record of the street and number of an employee's address submitted to a special district
39 to obtain assistance in promoting an alternative to single occupant motor vehicle transportation.

40 (29) Sensitive business records, capital development plans or financial or commercial information
41 of Oregon Corrections Enterprises that is not customarily provided to business competitors.

42 (30) Documents, materials or other information submitted to the Director of the Department of
43 Consumer and Business Services in confidence by a state, federal, foreign or international regulatory
44 or law enforcement agency or by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners, its affiliates
45 or subsidiaries under ORS 646.380 to 646.396, 697.005 to 697.095, 697.602 to 697.842, 705.137, 717.200

1 to 717.320, 717.900 or 717.905, ORS chapter 59, 722, 723, 725 or 726, the Bank Act or the Insurance
2 Code when:

3 (a) The document, material or other information is received upon notice or with an under-
4 standing that it is confidential or privileged under the laws of the jurisdiction that is the source of
5 the document, material or other information; and

6 (b) The director has obligated the Department of Consumer and Business Services not to dis-
7 close the document, material or other information.

8 (31) A county elections security plan developed and filed under ORS 254.074.

9 (32) Information about review or approval of programs relating to the security of:

10 (a) Generation, storage or conveyance of:

11 (A) Electricity;

12 (B) Gas in liquefied or gaseous form;

13 (C) Hazardous substances as defined in ORS 453.005 (7)(a), (b) and (d);

14 (D) Petroleum products;

15 (E) Sewage; or

16 (F) Water.

17 (b) Telecommunication systems, including cellular, wireless or radio systems.

18 (c) Data transmissions by whatever means provided.

19 **(33) If requested by a public safety officer as defined in ORS 181.610, the home address,**
20 **home telephone number and electronic mail address of the public safety officer. This ex-**
21 **emption does not apply to addresses and telephone numbers that are contained in county real**
22 **property or lien records.**

23 **SECTION 2.** ORS 181.854 is amended to read:

24 181.854. (1) As used in this section:

25 (a) "Public body" has the meaning given that term in ORS 192.410.

26 (b) "Public safety employee" means a certified reserve officer, corrections officer, parole and
27 probation officer, police officer or youth correction officer as those terms are defined in ORS
28 181.610.

29 (2) A public body may not disclose a photograph of a public safety employee of the public body
30 without the written consent of the employee. This subsection does not apply to the use by the public
31 body of a photograph of a public safety employee.

32 (3) A public body may not disclose information about a personnel investigation of a public safety
33 employee of the public body if the investigation does not result in discipline of the employee.

34 (4) Subsection (3) of this section does not apply:

35 (a) When the public interest requires disclosure of the information.

36 (b) When the employee consents to disclosure in writing.

37 (c) When disclosure is necessary for an investigation by the public body, the Department of
38 Public Safety Standards and Training or a citizen review body designated by the public body.

39 (d) When the public body determines that nondisclosure of the information would adversely af-
40 fect the confidence of the public in the public body.

41 (5) If an investigation of a public safety employee of a public body results from a complaint, the
42 public body may disclose to the complainant the disposition of the complaint and, to the extent the
43 public body considers necessary to explain the action of the public body on the complaint, a written
44 summary of information obtained in the investigation.

45 (6) A public body must notify a public safety employee of the public body if the public body re-

1 ceives a request for:

2 (a) A photograph of the employee.

3 (b) Information about the employee that is exempt from disclosure under ORS 192.502 (2), [or]

4 (3) **or (33)**.

5 (c) Information about the employee that is prohibited from disclosure by subsection (3) of this
6 section.

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
