

# Senate Bill 232

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## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Provides for affirmative defense of mental disease or defect constituting insanity in juvenile delinquency proceedings. Establishes disposition for juveniles who successfully use affirmative defense and have serious mental condition or present substantial danger to others. Increases number of members on Psychiatric Security Review Board. Divides board into adult and juvenile panels. Appropriates moneys to board.

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2005.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to juveniles; creating new provisions; amending ORS 21.010, 40.015, 137.290, 137.712,  
3 151.216, 161.375, 161.385, 181.595, 181.607, 419A.004, 419B.100, 419C.005, 419C.285, 419C.400,  
4 419C.411, 419C.501, 419C.626 and 419C.656; appropriating money; and declaring an emergency.

5 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

6 **SECTION 1.** ORS 419A.004 is amended to read:

7 419A.004. As used in this chapter and ORS chapters 419B and 419C, unless the context requires  
8 otherwise:

9 (1) "CASA Volunteer Program" means a program approved or sanctioned by the juvenile court  
10 to recruit, train and supervise volunteer persons to serve as court appointed special advocates.

11 (2) "Child care center" means a residential facility for wards or youth offenders that is licensed  
12 under the provisions of ORS 418.240.

13 (3) "Community service" has the meaning given that term in ORS 137.126.

14 (4) "Conflict of interest" means a person appointed to a local citizen review board who has a  
15 personal or pecuniary interest in a case being reviewed by that board.

16 (5) "Counselor" means a juvenile department counselor.

17 (6) "Court" means the juvenile court.

18 (7) "Court appointed special advocate" or "CASA" means a person appointed by the court pur-  
19 suant to a CASA Volunteer Program to act as special advocate pursuant to ORS 419A.170.

20 (8) "Court facility" has the meaning given that term in ORS 166.360.

21 (9) "Department" means the Department of Human Services.

22 (10) "Detention" or "detention facility" means a facility established under ORS 419A.010 to  
23 419A.020 and 419A.050 to 419A.063 for the detention of children, wards, youths or youth offenders  
24 pursuant to a judicial commitment or order.

25 (11) "Director" means the director of a juvenile department established under ORS 419A.010 to  
26 419A.020 and 419A.050 to 419A.063.

27 (12) "Guardian" means guardian of the person and not guardian of the estate.

28 (13) "Indian child" means any unmarried person less than 18 years of age who is:

**NOTE:** Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

- 1 (a) A member of an Indian tribe; or
- 2 (b) Eligible for membership in an Indian tribe and is the biological child of a member of an In-
- 3 dian tribe.
- 4 (14) "Juvenile court" means the court having jurisdiction of juvenile matters in the several
- 5 counties of this state.
- 6 (15) "Local citizen review board" means the board specified by ORS 419A.090 and 419A.092.
- 7 (16) "Parent" means the biological or adoptive mother and the legal or adoptive father of the
- 8 child, ward, youth or youth offender. A legal father includes:
- 9 (a) A nonimpotent, nonsterile man who was cohabiting with his wife, who is the mother of the
- 10 child, ward, youth or youth offender, at the time of conception;
- 11 (b) A man married to the mother of the child, ward, youth or youth offender at the time of birth,
- 12 when there is no judgment of separation and the presumption of paternity has not been disputed;
- 13 (c) A biological father who marries the mother of the child, ward, youth or youth offender after
- 14 the birth of the child, ward, youth or youth offender;
- 15 (d) A biological father who has established or declared paternity through filiation proceedings
- 16 or under ORS 416.400 to 416.470; and
- 17 (e) A biological father who has, with the mother, established paternity through a voluntary ac-
- 18 knowledgment of paternity under ORS 109.070.
- 19 (17) "Permanent foster care" means an out-of-home placement in which there is a long-term
- 20 contractual foster care agreement between the foster parents and the department that is approved
- 21 by the juvenile court and in which the foster parents commit to raise a ward in substitute care or
- 22 youth offender until the age of majority.
- 23 (18) "Planned permanent living arrangement" means an out-of-home placement other than by
- 24 adoption, placement with a relative or placement with a legal guardian that is consistent with the
- 25 case plan and in the best interests of the ward.
- 26 (19) "Public building" has the meaning given that term in ORS 166.360.
- 27 (20) "Reasonable time" means a period of time that is reasonable given a child or ward's emo-
- 28 tional and developmental needs and ability to form and maintain lasting attachments.
- 29 (21) "Records" means any information in written form, pictures, photographs, charts, graphs,
- 30 recordings or documents pertaining to a case.
- 31 (22) "Resides" or "residence," when used in reference to the residence of a child, ward, youth
- 32 or youth offender, means the place where the child, ward, youth or youth offender is actually living
- 33 or the jurisdiction in which wardship or jurisdiction has been established.
- 34 (23) "Restitution" has the meaning given that term in ORS 137.103.
- 35 (24) "Serious physical injury" means:
- 36 (a) A serious physical injury as defined in ORS 161.015; or
- 37 (b) A physical injury that:
- 38 (A) Has a permanent or protracted significant effect on a child's daily activities;
- 39 (B) Results in substantial and recurring pain; or
- 40 (C) In the case of a child under 10 years of age, is a broken bone.
- 41 (25) "Shelter care" means a home or other facility suitable for the safekeeping of a child, ward,
- 42 youth or youth offender who is taken into temporary custody pending investigation and disposition.
- 43 (26) "Short-term detention facility" means a facility established under ORS 419A.050 (3) for
- 44 holding children, youths and youth offenders pending further placement.
- 45 (27) "Substitute care" means an out-of-home placement directly supervised by the department

1 or other agency, including placement in a foster family home, group home or other child caring in-  
 2 stitution or facility. “Substitute care” does not include care in:

3 (a) A detention facility, forestry camp or youth correction facility;

4 (b) A family home that the court has approved as a ward’s permanent placement, when a private  
 5 child caring agency has been appointed guardian of the ward and when the ward’s care is entirely  
 6 privately financed; or

7 (c) In-home placement subject to conditions or limitations.

8 (28) “Surrogate” means a person appointed by the court to protect the right of the child, ward,  
 9 youth or youth offender to receive procedural safeguards with respect to the provision of free ap-  
 10 propriate public education.

11 (29) “Tribal court” means a court with jurisdiction over child custody proceedings and that is  
 12 either a Court of Indian Offenses, a court established and operated under the code of custom of an  
 13 Indian tribe or any other administrative body of a tribe that is vested with authority over child  
 14 custody proceedings.

15 (30) “Ward” means a person within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court under ORS 419B.100.

16 **(31) “Young person” means a person who has been found responsible except for insanity**  
 17 **under ORS 419C.411 and placed under the jurisdiction of the Psychiatric Security Review**  
 18 **Board.**

19 [(31)] **(32) “Youth” means a person under 18 years of age who is alleged to have committed an**  
 20 **act that is a violation, or, if done by an adult would constitute a violation, of a law or ordinance**  
 21 **of the United States or a state, county or city.**

22 [(32)] **(33) “Youth care center” has the meaning given that term in ORS 420.855.**

23 [(33)] **(34) “Youth offender” means a person who has been found to be within the jurisdiction**  
 24 **of the juvenile court under ORS 419C.005 for an act committed when the person was under 18 years**  
 25 **of age.**

26 **SECTION 2. Sections 3 to 6 of this 2005 Act are added to and made a part of ORS chapter**  
 27 **419C.**

28 **SECTION 3. As used in ORS 419C.411 and sections 4 to 6 and 13 to 19 of this 2005 Act:**

29 **(1) “Conditional release” includes but is not limited to the monitoring of mental and**  
 30 **physical health treatment.**

31 **(2) “Mental disease or defect” does not include an abnormality:**

32 **(a) Manifested only by repeated criminal or otherwise antisocial conduct;**

33 **(b) Constituting solely a personality disorder; or**

34 **(c) Constituting solely a conduct disorder.**

35 **(3) “Serious mental condition” means a condition that requires supervision and treat-**  
 36 **ment services for the safety of others and is:**

37 **(a) A mental illness of major depression;**

38 **(b) A mental illness of bipolar disorder;**

39 **(c) A mental illness of psychotic disorder; or**

40 **(d) A mental defect manifesting in significantly subaverage general intellectual func-**  
 41 **tioning that is accompanied by significant limitations in adaptive functioning in at least two**  
 42 **areas or characterized by severe and pervasive impairment manifested during the develop-**  
 43 **mental period.**

44 **SECTION 4. Mental disease or defect constituting insanity under ORS 419C.411 (2) is an**  
 45 **affirmative defense.**

1       **SECTION 5. (1) A youth may not introduce evidence on the issue of the defense set forth**  
2 **in section 4 of this 2005 Act unless the youth gives notice of intent to do so in the manner**  
3 **provided in subsection (2) of this section.**

4       **(2) A youth who is required under subsection (1) of this section to give notice must do**  
5 **so by filing a written notice of intent. A youth who is not in detention must file the notice**  
6 **of intent no later than 60 days after the petition is filed unless the court finds good cause**  
7 **to extend the time. If the youth fails to file notice timely, the youth may not introduce evi-**  
8 **dence for the establishment of the defense set forth in section 4 of this 2005 Act unless the**  
9 **court permits the evidence to be introduced when just cause for failure to file the notice is**  
10 **shown.**

11       **(3) Just cause for failure to file notice timely exists if the youth was not represented by**  
12 **counsel until after the filing period.**

13       **(4) The filing of a notice of intent under this section by a youth in detention constitutes**  
14 **express consent of the youth for continued detention under ORS 419C.150.**

15       **SECTION 6. Upon the filing of a written notice of intent or the introduction of evidence**  
16 **by the youth as provided in section 5 of this 2005 Act, the state may have at least one psy-**  
17 **chiatrist certified, or eligible to be certified, by the Board of Medical Examiners in child**  
18 **psychiatry or licensed psychologist with expertise in child psychology of its selection examine**  
19 **the youth. Unless the court finds good cause to extend the time, the state must obtain an**  
20 **examination under this section no later than 60 days after the notice of intent was filed or**  
21 **the evidence was introduced. The state shall file notice with the court of its intention to have**  
22 **the youth examined. Upon filing of the notice, the court shall order the youth to participate**  
23 **in an examination. If the youth objects to the examiner chosen by the state, the court for**  
24 **good cause shown may direct the state to select a different examiner. The examiner shall**  
25 **provide a copy of the report generated from the examination to the state. A report generated**  
26 **from an examination under this section is a report relating to the youth's history and**  
27 **prognosis under ORS 419A.255 (2).**

28       **SECTION 7. ORS 419C.005 is amended to read:**

29       419C.005. (1) Except as otherwise provided in ORS 137.707, the juvenile court has exclusive or-  
30 iginal jurisdiction in any case involving a person who is under 18 years of age and who has com-  
31 mitted an act that is a violation, or that if done by an adult would constitute a violation, of a law  
32 or ordinance of the United States or a state, county or city.

33       (2) The provisions of subsection (1) of this section do not prevent a court of competent juris-  
34 diction from entertaining a civil action or suit involving a youth.

35       (3) The court does not have jurisdiction as provided in subsection (1) of this section after a mi-  
36 nor has been emancipated pursuant to ORS 419B.550 to 419B.558.

37       (4) The court's jurisdiction over a person under this section or ORS 419C.067 continues until  
38 one of the following occurs:

39       (a) The court dismisses a petition filed under this chapter or waives the case under ORS  
40 419C.340. If jurisdiction is based on a previous adjudication, then dismissal or waiver of a later case  
41 does not terminate jurisdiction under the previous case unless the court so orders.

42       (b) The court transfers jurisdiction of the case as provided in ORS 419C.053, 419C.056 and  
43 419C.059.

44       (c) The court enters an order terminating jurisdiction.

45       (d) The person becomes 25 years of age.

1       **(e) The court places the person under the jurisdiction of the Psychiatric Security Review**  
 2 **Board as provided in section 13 of this 2005 Act. If the court also has jurisdiction over the**  
 3 **person based on a previous adjudication under this chapter or ORS chapter 419B, placing a**  
 4 **person under the jurisdiction of the board in a later case does not terminate wardship under**  
 5 **the previous case unless the court so orders.**

6       **SECTION 8.** ORS 419C.285 is amended to read:

7       419C.285. (1) At the adjudication stage of a delinquency proceeding, the parties to the proceed-  
 8 ing are the youth and the state, represented by the district attorney or the juvenile department. At  
 9 the dispositional stage of a delinquency proceeding, the following are also parties:

10       (a) The parents or guardian of the youth;

11       (b) A court appointed special advocate, if appointed;

12       (c) The Oregon Youth Authority or other child care agency, if the youth is temporarily com-  
 13 mitted to the agency; and

14       (d) An intervenor who petitions or files a motion on the basis of a child-parent relationship un-  
 15 der ORS 109.119.

16       (2) The rights of the parties include, but are not limited to:

17       (a) The right to notice of the proceeding and copies of the pleadings;

18       (b) The right to appear with counsel and to have counsel appointed if otherwise provided by law;

19       (c) The right to call witnesses, cross-examine witnesses and participate in hearings;

20       (d) The right to appeal; *[and]*

21       (e) The right to request a hearing; **and**

22       **(f) The right to notice of any proceeding before the Psychiatric Security Review Board.**

23       (3)(a) Persons who are not parties under subsection (1) of this section may petition the court for  
 24 rights of limited participation. The petition must be filed and served on all parties no later than two  
 25 weeks before a proceeding in the case in which participation is sought. The petition must state:

26       (A) The reason the participation is sought;

27       (B) How the person's involvement is in the best interest of the youth or the administration of  
 28 justice;

29       (C) Why the parties cannot adequately present the case; and

30       (D) What specific relief is being sought.

31       (b) If the court finds that the petition is well founded, the court may grant rights of limited  
 32 participation as specified by the court.

33       (c) Persons petitioning for rights of limited participation are not entitled to appointed counsel.

34       (4) In all delinquency proceedings, interpreters shall be appointed in the manner specified by  
 35 ORS 45.275 and 45.285 for the parties to the proceeding, any person granted rights of limited par-  
 36 ticipation, and any parent or guardian of the youth without regard to whether the parent or  
 37 guardian is a party to the proceeding.

38       **SECTION 9.** ORS 419C.400 is amended to read:

39       419C.400. (1) The hearing shall be held by the court without a jury and may be continued from  
 40 time to time.

41       (2) The facts alleged in the petition showing the youth to be within the jurisdiction of the court  
 42 as provided in ORS 419C.005, unless admitted, must be established beyond a reasonable doubt.

43       **(3) If the youth files written notice of intent to rely on the defense set forth in section**  
 44 **4 of this 2005 Act, the youth has the burden of proving the defense by a preponderance of**  
 45 **the evidence.**

1        [(3)] (4) For the purpose of determining proper disposition of the youth, testimony, reports or  
 2 other material relating to the youth's mental, physical and social history and prognosis may be re-  
 3 ceived by the court without regard to their competency or relevancy under the rules of evidence.

4        [(4)] (5) An adjudication by a juvenile court that a youth is within its jurisdiction is not a con-  
 5 viction of a crime or offense.

6        **SECTION 10.** ORS 419C.411 is amended to read:

7        419C.411. (1) At the termination of the hearing or hearings in the proceeding or after entry of  
 8 an order under ORS 419C.067, the court shall enter an appropriate order directing the disposition  
 9 to be made of the case.

10        **(2) The court shall find a youth responsible except for insanity if:**

11        **(a) The youth asserted mental disease or defect as a defense as provided in section 5 of**  
 12 **this 2005 Act; and**

13        **(b) The court determined by a preponderance of the evidence that, as a result of mental**  
 14 **disease or defect at the time the youth committed the act alleged in the petition, the youth**  
 15 **lacked substantial capacity either to appreciate the nature and quality of the act or to con-**  
 16 **form the youth's conduct to the requirements of law.**

17        [(2)] (3) **Except as otherwise provided in subsections (6) and (7) of this section,** in deter-  
 18 mining the disposition of the case, the court shall consider each of the following:

19        (a) The gravity of the loss, damage or injury caused or attempted during, or as part of, the  
 20 conduct that is the basis for jurisdiction under ORS 419C.005;

21        (b) Whether the manner in which the youth offender engaged in the conduct was aggressive,  
 22 violent, premeditated or willful;

23        (c) Whether the youth offender was held in detention under ORS 419C.145 and, if so, the reasons  
 24 for the detention;

25        (d) The immediate and future protection required by the victim, the victim's family and the  
 26 community; and

27        (e) The youth offender's juvenile court record and response to the requirements and conditions  
 28 imposed by previous juvenile court orders.

29        [(3)] (4) In addition to the factors listed in subsection [(2)] (3) of this section, the court may  
 30 consider the following:

31        (a) Whether the youth offender has made any efforts toward reform or rehabilitation or making  
 32 restitution;

33        (b) The youth offender's educational status and school attendance record;

34        (c) The youth offender's past and present employment;

35        (d) The disposition proposed by the youth offender;

36        (e) The recommendations of the district attorney and the juvenile court counselor and the  
 37 statements of the victim and the victim's family;

38        (f) The youth offender's mental, emotional and physical health and the results of the mental  
 39 health or substance abuse treatment; and

40        (g) Any other relevant factors or circumstances raised by the parties.

41        [(4)] (5) The court's consideration of matters under this section may be addressed on appeal only  
 42 if raised by a party at a dispositional hearing or by a motion to modify or set aside under ORS  
 43 419C.610.

44        **(6) When a youth is found responsible except for insanity, the court shall order a dispo-**  
 45 **sition under section 13 of this 2005 Act if the court finds by a preponderance of the evidence**

1 **that, at the time of disposition, the youth:**

2 (a) **Has a serious mental condition; or**

3 (b) **Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition and presents a**  
4 **substantial danger to others.**

5 (7) **When a youth is found responsible except for insanity and the court does not make**  
6 **a finding described in subsection (6) of this section, the court may:**

7 (a) **Enter an order finding the youth to be within the court's jurisdiction under ORS**  
8 **419B.100 and make any disposition authorized by ORS chapter 419B;**

9 (b) **Initiate civil commitment proceedings; or**

10 (c) **Enter an order of discharge.**

11 **SECTION 11.** ORS 419C.501 is amended to read:

12 419C.501. (1) **The court shall fix** the duration of any disposition made pursuant to this chapter  
13 [*shall be fixed by the court*] and **the duration** may be for an indefinite period. Any placement in the  
14 legal custody of the Department of Human Services or the Oregon Youth Authority under ORS  
15 419C.478 **or placement under the jurisdiction of the Psychiatric Security Review Board under**  
16 **section 13 of this 2005 Act** shall be for an indefinite period. However, [*in cases under ORS*  
17 *419C.005,*] the period of institutionalization or commitment may not exceed:

18 (a) The period of time specified in the statute defining the crime for an act that would constitute  
19 an unclassified misdemeanor if committed by an adult;

20 (b) Thirty days for an act that would constitute a Class C misdemeanor if committed by an adult;

21 (c) Six months for an act that would constitute a Class B misdemeanor if committed by an adult;

22 (d) One year for an act that would constitute a Class A misdemeanor if committed by an adult;

23 (e) Five years for an act that would constitute a Class C felony if committed by an adult;

24 (f) Ten years for an act that would constitute a Class B felony if committed by an adult; [*and*]

25 (g) Twenty years for an act that would constitute a Class A felony if committed by an adult;

26 **and**

27 (h) **Life for a young person who was found to have committed an act that, if committed**  
28 **by an adult would constitute murder or any aggravated form of murder under ORS 163.095**  
29 **or 163.115.**

30 (2) **Except as provided in subsection (1)(h) of this section,** the period of any disposition may  
31 not extend beyond the date on which the **young person or** youth offender becomes 25 years of age.

32 **SECTION 12.** Sections 13 to 19 of this 2005 Act are added to and made a part of ORS  
33 chapter 419C.

34 **SECTION 13.** (1) **After the entry of a jurisdictional order under ORS 419C.411 (2), if the**  
35 **court finds by a preponderance of the evidence that the young person, at the time of dispo-**  
36 **sition, has a serious mental condition or has a mental disease or defect other than a serious**  
37 **mental condition and presents a substantial danger to others, requiring conditional release**  
38 **or commitment to a hospital or facility designated by the Department of Human Services,**  
39 **the court shall order the young person placed under the jurisdiction of the Psychiatric Se-**  
40 **curity Review Board.**

41 (2) **The court shall determine whether the young person should be committed to a hos-**  
42 **pital or facility designated by the department or conditionally released pending a hearing**  
43 **before the juvenile panel of the Psychiatric Security Review Board as follows:**

44 (a) **If the court finds that the young person is not a proper subject for conditional re-**  
45 **lease, the court shall order the young person committed to a hospital or facility designated**

1 by the department for custody, supervision and treatment pending a hearing before the ju-  
2 venile panel in accordance with sections 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18 of this 2005 Act and shall order  
3 the young person placed under the jurisdiction of the board.

4 (b) If the court finds that the young person can be adequately controlled with supervision  
5 and treatment services if conditionally released and that necessary supervision and treat-  
6 ment services are available, the court may order the young person conditionally released,  
7 subject to those supervisory orders of the court that are in the best interests of justice and  
8 the young person. The court shall designate a qualified mental health or developmental dis-  
9 abilities treatment provider or state, county or local agency to supervise the young person  
10 on release, subject to those conditions as the court directs in the order for conditional re-  
11 lease. Prior to the designation, the court shall notify the qualified mental health or develop-  
12 mental disabilities treatment provider or agency to whom conditional release is contemplated  
13 and provide the qualified mental health or developmental disabilities treatment provider or  
14 agency an opportunity to be heard before the court. After receiving an order entered under  
15 this paragraph, the qualified mental health or developmental disabilities treatment provider  
16 or agency designated shall assume supervision of the young person subject to the direction  
17 of the juvenile panel. The qualified mental health or developmental disabilities treatment  
18 provider or agency designated as supervisor shall report in writing no less than once per  
19 month to the juvenile panel concerning the supervised young person's compliance with the  
20 conditions of release.

21 (c) For purposes of determining whether to order commitment to a hospital or facility  
22 or conditional release, the primary concern of the court is the protection of society.

23 (3) In determining whether a young person should be conditionally released, the court  
24 may order examinations or evaluations deemed necessary.

25 (4) Upon placing a young person on conditional release and ordering the young person  
26 placed under the jurisdiction of the board, the court shall notify the juvenile panel in writing  
27 of the court's conditional release order, the supervisor designated and all other conditions  
28 of release pending a hearing before the juvenile panel in accordance with sections 14, 15, 16,  
29 17 and 18 of this 2005 Act.

30 (5) When making an order under this section, the court shall:

31 (a) Determine whether the parent or guardian of the young person is able and willing to  
32 assist the young person in obtaining necessary mental health or developmental disabilities  
33 services and is willing to acquiesce in the decisions of the juvenile panel. If the court finds  
34 that the parent or guardian:

35 (A) Is able and willing to do so, the court shall order the parent or guardian to sign an  
36 irrevocable consent form in which the parent agrees to any placement decision made by the  
37 juvenile panel.

38 (B) Is unable or unwilling to do so, the court shall order that the young person be placed  
39 in the legal custody of the Department of Human Services for the purpose of obtaining nec-  
40 essary mental health or developmental disabilities services.

41 (b) Make specific findings on whether there is a victim and, if so, whether the victim  
42 wishes to be notified of any board hearings concerning the young person and of any condi-  
43 tional release, discharge or escape of the young person.

44 (c) Include in the order a list of the persons who wish to be notified of any board hearing  
45 concerning the young person.

1 (d) Determine on the record the act committed by the young person for which the young  
2 person was found responsible except for insanity.

3 **SECTION 14.** (1) The juvenile panel of the Psychiatric Security Review Board shall con-  
4 duct hearings on an application for discharge, conditional release, commitment or modifica-  
5 tion filed under or required by section 16, 17 or 18 of this 2005 Act, and shall make findings  
6 on the issues before the juvenile panel.

7 (2) In every hearing before the juvenile panel, the juvenile panel shall determine whether  
8 the young person:

9 (a) Has a serious mental condition; or

10 (b) Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition and presents a  
11 substantial danger to others.

12 (3) The juvenile panel shall order a young person discharged from commitment or con-  
13 ditional release if the juvenile panel finds that the young person:

14 (a) No longer has a mental disease or defect; or

15 (b) Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition but no longer  
16 presents a substantial danger to others.

17 (4) The juvenile panel shall order a young person conditionally released subject to section  
18 16 of this 2005 Act if the juvenile panel finds that:

19 (a) The young person:

20 (A) Has a serious mental condition; or

21 (B) Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition and presents a  
22 substantial danger to others;

23 (b) The young person can be adequately controlled with treatment services as a condition  
24 of release; and

25 (c) Necessary supervision and treatment services are available.

26 (5) The juvenile panel shall order a young person committed to, or retained in, a hospital  
27 or facility designated by the Department of Human Services for custody, supervision and  
28 treatment subject to section 17 of this 2005 Act if the juvenile panel finds that the young  
29 person:

30 (a)(A) Has a serious mental condition; or

31 (B) Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition and presents a  
32 substantial danger to others; and

33 (b) Cannot be adequately controlled if conditionally released.

34 (6) In determining whether a young person should be committed to or retained in a hos-  
35 pital or facility, conditionally released or discharged, the primary concern of the juvenile  
36 panel is the protection of society.

37 (7) In a hearing before the juvenile panel, a young person who has a mental disease or  
38 defect in a state of remission is considered to have a mental disease or defect if the mental  
39 disease or defect may, with reasonable medical probability, occasionally become active.

40 (8) At any time, the juvenile panel may appoint a psychiatrist certified, or eligible to be  
41 certified, by the Board of Medical Examiners in child psychiatry or a licensed psychologist  
42 with expertise in child psychology to examine the young person and submit a written report  
43 to the juvenile panel. Reports filed with the juvenile panel pursuant to the examination must  
44 include, but need not be limited to, an opinion as to whether the young person:

45 (a)(A) Has a serious mental condition; or

1 (B) Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition and presents a  
 2 substantial danger to others; and

3 (b) Could be adequately controlled with treatment services as a condition of release.

4 (9) The juvenile panel may make a determination regarding discharge or conditional re-  
 5 lease based upon the written report submitted under subsection (8) of this section or section  
 6 17 (3) of this 2005 Act. If a member of the juvenile panel desires further information from  
 7 the examining psychiatrist or licensed psychologist who submitted the report, the juvenile  
 8 panel shall summon the psychiatrist or psychologist to give testimony.

9 (10) The juvenile panel shall consider all available evidence that is material, relevant and  
 10 reliable regarding the issues before the juvenile panel. Evidence may include, but is not lim-  
 11 ited to, the record of the juvenile court adjudication, information supplied by the attorney  
 12 representing the state or by any other interested person, including the young person, infor-  
 13 mation concerning the young person's mental condition and the entire psychiatric and juve-  
 14 nile court history of the young person. All evidence of a type commonly relied upon by  
 15 reasonably prudent persons in the conduct of their serious affairs is admissible at the  
 16 hearings. Testimony must be taken upon oath or affirmation of the witness from whom re-  
 17 ceived. The officer presiding at the hearing shall administer oaths and affirmations to wit-  
 18 nesses.

19 (11) The standard of proof on all issues at a hearing of the juvenile panel is by a pre-  
 20 ponderance of the evidence.

21 (12)(a) The juvenile panel shall furnish written notice of any hearing pending under this  
 22 section within a reasonable time prior to the hearing to:

23 (A) The young person about whom the hearing is being conducted;

24 (B) The attorney representing the young person;

25 (C) The young person's parents or guardians, if known;

26 (D) The person having legal custody of the young person;

27 (E) The Attorney General or other attorney representing the state, if any; and

28 (F) The district attorney and the court or juvenile department of the county in which the  
 29 young person was adjudicated.

30 (b) The juvenile panel shall include in the notice required by paragraph (a) of this sub-  
 31 section:

32 (A) The time, place and location of the hearing;

33 (B) The nature of the hearing, the specific action for which the hearing has been re-  
 34 quested, the issues to be considered at the hearing and a reference to the particular sections  
 35 of the statutes and rules involved;

36 (C) A statement of the authority and jurisdiction under which the hearing is to be held;  
 37 and

38 (D) A statement of all rights under subsection (13) of this section.

39 (13) A young person about whom a hearing is being held has the right:

40 (a) To appear at all proceedings held under this section, except juvenile panel deliber-  
 41 ations.

42 (b) To cross-examine all witnesses appearing to testify at the hearing.

43 (c) To subpoena witnesses and documents as provided in ORS 161.395.

44 (d) To be represented by suitable legal counsel possessing skills and experience  
 45 commensurate with the nature and complexity of the case, to consult with counsel prior to

1 the hearing and, if financially eligible, to have suitable counsel appointed at state expense.

2 (e) To examine all information, documents and reports that the juvenile panel considers  
3 and, if the information, documents and reports are available to the juvenile panel before the  
4 hearing, to examine them prior to the hearing.

5 (14) Except for deliberations of the juvenile panel, the juvenile panel shall keep a record  
6 of all hearings before the juvenile panel.

7 (15) Upon request of a person listed in subsection (12)(a) of this section or on its own  
8 motion, the juvenile panel may continue a hearing for a reasonable period not to exceed 60  
9 days to obtain additional information or testimony or for other good cause shown.

10 (16) Within 15 days after the conclusion of the hearing, the juvenile panel shall provide  
11 written notice of the juvenile panel's decision to the young person, the attorney representing  
12 the young person, the young person's parents or guardians, if known, the person having legal  
13 custody of the young person, the district attorney of the county in which the young person  
14 was adjudicated and the Attorney General or other attorney representing the state, if any.

15 (17) The juvenile panel shall maintain and keep current the medical, social and delin-  
16 quency history of all young persons. The juvenile panel shall determine the confidentiality  
17 of records maintained by the juvenile panel pursuant to ORS 192.501 to 192.505.

18 **SECTION 15.** (1) If the juvenile panel of the Psychiatric Security Review Board deter-  
19 mines that a young person about whom a hearing under section 14 of this 2005 Act is being  
20 held is financially eligible, the juvenile panel shall appoint suitable counsel to represent the  
21 young person. Counsel appointed must be an attorney who satisfies the professional quali-  
22 fication standards established by the Public Defense Services Commission under ORS 151.216.  
23 The public defense services executive director shall determine and allow fair compensation  
24 for counsel appointed under this subsection and the reasonable expenses of the young person  
25 in respect to the hearing. Compensation payable to appointed counsel may not be less than  
26 the applicable compensation level established under ORS 151.216. The public defense services  
27 executive director shall pay compensation and expenses allowed from funds available for that  
28 purpose.

29 (2) When the juvenile panel appoints counsel to represent the young person, the juvenile  
30 panel may order the young person, if able, parent, if able, or guardian of the estate, if the  
31 estate is able, to pay to the Public Defense Services Account in the General Fund, through  
32 the clerk of the court, in full or in part, the administrative costs of determining the ability  
33 of the young person, parent or estate to pay for legal services and the costs of the legal and  
34 other services that are related to the provision of appointed counsel. The juvenile panel's  
35 order of payment may be entered in the County Clerk Lien Record and enforced as provided  
36 in ORS 205.126.

37 (3) The test of the young person's, parent's or estate's ability to pay costs under sub-  
38 section (2) of this section is the same test as applied to appointment of counsel for defend-  
39 ants under ORS 135.050 or under the rules adopted under ORS 151.216. If counsel is provided  
40 at state expense, the juvenile panel shall apply this test in accordance with the guidelines  
41 adopted by the Public Defense Services Commission under ORS 151.485.

42 (4) If counsel is provided at state expense, the juvenile panel shall determine the amount  
43 the young person, parent or estate is required to pay for the costs of administrative, legal  
44 and other services related to the provision of appointed counsel in the same manner as this  
45 amount is determined under ORS 151.487.

1           (5) The Attorney General may represent the state at contested hearings before the ju-  
2 venile panel unless the district attorney of the county in which the young person was adju-  
3 dicated elects to represent the state. The district attorney of the county in which the young  
4 person was adjudicated shall cooperate with the Attorney General in securing the material  
5 necessary for presenting a contested hearing before the juvenile panel. If the district attor-  
6 ney elects to represent the state, the district attorney shall give timely written notice to the  
7 Attorney General, the juvenile panel and the attorney representing the young person.

8           **SECTION 16.** (1) When the juvenile panel of the Psychiatric Security Review Board or-  
9 ders a young person conditionally released under section 14 (4) of this 2005 Act, the juvenile  
10 panel may designate a qualified mental health or developmental disabilities treatment pro-  
11 vider or state, county or local agency to supervise the young person on release subject to  
12 those conditions as the juvenile panel directs in the order for conditional release. Prior to  
13 the designation, the juvenile panel shall notify the qualified mental health or developmental  
14 disabilities treatment provider or agency to whom conditional release is contemplated and  
15 provide the qualified mental health or developmental disabilities treatment provider or  
16 agency an opportunity to be heard before the juvenile panel. After receiving an order entered  
17 under section 14 (4) of this 2005 Act, the qualified mental health or developmental disabilities  
18 treatment provider or agency designated shall assume supervision of the young person pur-  
19 suant to the direction of the juvenile panel.

20           (2) Conditions of release contained in orders entered under section 14 (4) of this 2005 Act  
21 may be modified from time to time and conditional release may be terminated by order of  
22 the juvenile panel as provided in sections 14 and 18 of this 2005 Act.

23           (3)(a) As a condition of release, the juvenile panel may require the young person to report  
24 to any state, county or local mental health or developmental disabilities facility for evalu-  
25 ation. Whenever medical, psychiatric or psychological treatment is recommended, the juve-  
26 nile panel may order the young person, as a condition of release, to cooperate with and  
27 accept the treatment of the facility.

28           (b) The facility to which the young person has been referred for evaluation shall perform  
29 the evaluation and submit a written report of its findings to the juvenile panel. If the facility  
30 finds that treatment of the young person is appropriate, the facility shall include its recom-  
31 mendations for treatment in the report to the juvenile panel.

32           (c) Whenever treatment is provided by the facility, the facility shall furnish reports to  
33 the juvenile panel on a regular basis concerning the progress of the young person.

34           (d) The facility shall comply with any other conditions of release prescribed by order of  
35 the juvenile panel.

36           (4) If at any time it appears to the juvenile panel or the chairperson of the juvenile panel  
37 that a young person has violated the terms of conditional release or that the mental health  
38 of the young person has changed, the juvenile panel or the chairperson of the juvenile panel  
39 may order the young person returned to a hospital or facility designated by the Department  
40 of Human Services for evaluation and treatment. A written order of the juvenile panel, or  
41 the chairperson of the juvenile panel on behalf of the juvenile panel, is sufficient warrant for  
42 any peace officer to take the young person into custody and transport the young person ac-  
43 cordingly. A peace officer shall execute the order, and the young person shall be returned  
44 as soon as practicable to a facility designated by the department. Within 20 days following  
45 the return of the young person to the facility designated by the department, the juvenile

1 panel shall conduct a hearing. At a hearing required by this subsection, the state has the  
2 burden of proving the young person's lack of fitness for conditional release.

3 (5) The community mental health and developmental disabilities program director, the  
4 director of the facility providing treatment for the young person on conditional release, a  
5 peace officer or a person responsible for the supervision of a young person on conditional  
6 release may take a young person into custody or request that the young person be taken into  
7 custody if there is reasonable cause to believe the young person presents a substantial dan-  
8 ger to others and that the young person is in need of immediate custody, supervision and  
9 treatment. A young person taken into custody under this subsection must immediately be  
10 transported to a hospital or facility designated by the department. Within 20 days following  
11 the return of the young person to the facility designated by the department, the juvenile  
12 panel shall conduct a hearing. At a hearing required by this subsection, the state has the  
13 burden of proving the young person's lack of fitness for conditional release.

14 (6)(a) A young person conditionally released under section 14 (4) of this 2005 Act may  
15 apply to the juvenile panel for discharge from or modification of an order of conditional re-  
16 lease on the ground that the young person no longer has a mental disease or defect or, if  
17 affected by a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition, no longer pre-  
18 sents a substantial danger to others and no longer requires supervision or treatment ser-  
19 vices. Within 60 days after receiving an application under this paragraph, the juvenile panel  
20 shall conduct a hearing. At a hearing required by this paragraph, the young person has the  
21 burden of proving the young person's fitness for discharge or modification of the order of  
22 conditional release. A young person may not apply for discharge or modification of condi-  
23 tional release more often than once every six months.

24 (b) Upon application by any qualified mental health or developmental disabilities treat-  
25 ment provider or state, county or local agency responsible for supervision or treatment  
26 services pursuant to an order of conditional release, the juvenile panel shall conduct a  
27 hearing to determine if the conditions of release should be continued, modified or terminated.  
28 The application must be accompanied by a report setting forth the facts supporting the ap-  
29 plication. At a hearing required by this paragraph, the state has the burden of proving the  
30 young person's lack of fitness for discharge or modification of the order of conditional re-  
31 lease.

32 SECTION 17. (1) The director of a hospital or facility to which a young person was com-  
33 mitted under section 14 (5) of this 2005 Act shall apply to the juvenile panel of the Psychiatric  
34 Security Review Board for an order of discharge or conditional release of the young person  
35 if, at any time after the commitment, the director is of the opinion that the young person:

36 (a) No longer has a mental disease or defect;

37 (b) Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition but no longer  
38 presents a substantial danger to others; or

39 (c) Can be controlled with proper supervision and treatment services if conditionally re-  
40 leased.

41 (2) The director shall include in an application under subsection (1) of this section a re-  
42 port setting forth the facts that support the opinion of the director. If the application is for  
43 conditional release, the director shall also include a verified conditional release plan. The  
44 juvenile panel shall hold a hearing on an application under subsection (1) of this section  
45 within 30 days of its receipt. Not less than 10 days prior to the hearing before the juvenile

1 panel, copies of the report must be sent to the Attorney General or other attorney repre-  
 2 senting the state, if any, the district attorney of the county in which the young person was  
 3 adjudicated, the young person, the young person's attorney, the young person's parents or  
 4 guardians, if known, and the person having legal custody of the young person.

5 (3) The attorney representing the state may choose a psychiatrist certified, or eligible to  
 6 be certified, by the Board of Medical Examiners in child psychiatry or a licensed psychologist  
 7 with expertise in child psychology to examine the young person prior to any decision of the  
 8 juvenile panel on discharge or conditional release. The results of the examination must be  
 9 in writing and filed with the juvenile panel and must include, but need not be limited to, an  
 10 opinion as to whether the young person:

11 (a)(A) Has a serious mental condition; or

12 (B) Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition and presents a  
 13 substantial danger to others; and

14 (b) Could be adequately controlled with treatment services as a condition of release.

15 (4) A young person who has been committed to a hospital or facility under section 14 (5)  
 16 of this 2005 Act or the young person's parents or guardians acting on the young person's  
 17 behalf may apply to the juvenile panel for an order of discharge or conditional release upon  
 18 the grounds that the young person:

19 (a) No longer has a mental disease or defect;

20 (b) Has a mental disease or defect other than a serious mental condition but no longer  
 21 presents a substantial danger to others; or

22 (c) Can be controlled with proper supervision and treatment services if conditionally re-  
 23 leased.

24 (5) When an application is made under subsection (4) of this section, the juvenile panel  
 25 shall require a report from the director of the hospital or facility. The director shall prepare  
 26 and transmit the report as provided in subsection (2) of this section.

27 (6) At a hearing on an application under subsection (4) of this section:

28 (a) The applicant has the burden of proving the young person's fitness for discharge or  
 29 conditional release; or

30 (b) If more than two years have passed since the state had the burden of proving the  
 31 young person's lack of fitness for discharge or conditional release, the state has the burden  
 32 of proving the young person's lack of fitness for discharge or conditional release.

33 (7) A person may not file an application for discharge or conditional release under sub-  
 34 section (4) of this section:

35 (a) Sooner than 90 days after the initial juvenile panel hearing concerning the young  
 36 person.

37 (b) If another application for discharge or conditional release of the young person was  
 38 filed during the immediately preceding 90 days.

39 (8) The juvenile panel shall hold a hearing on an application under subsection (4) of this  
 40 section within 30 days after the application is filed.

41 **SECTION 18.** (1) A young person committed by the court under section 13 of this 2005  
 42 Act to a hospital or facility designated by the Department of Human Services may not be  
 43 held in the hospital or facility for more than 90 days from the date of the court's commit-  
 44 ment order without an initial hearing before the juvenile panel of the Psychiatric Security  
 45 Review Board to determine whether the young person should be discharged or conditionally

1 released.

2 (2) A young person may not be held pursuant to an order under section 14 (5) of this 2005  
 3 Act for a period of time exceeding one year without a hearing before the juvenile panel to  
 4 determine whether the young person should be discharged or conditionally released.

5 (3) When a young person has spent three years on conditional release, the juvenile panel  
 6 shall bring the young person before the juvenile panel no later than 30 days after the expi-  
 7 ration of the three-year period. The juvenile panel shall review the young person's status and  
 8 determine whether the young person should be discharged from the jurisdiction of the board.

9 (4) Notwithstanding the fact that a young person who is brought before the juvenile panel  
 10 under subsection (3) of this section continues to have a serious mental condition, the juvenile  
 11 panel may discharge the young person if the young person did not exhibit behaviors that  
 12 presented a substantial danger to others during the period of conditional release and no  
 13 longer requires supervision by the juvenile panel.

14 **SECTION 19.** (1) When a young person attains 18 years of age, the juvenile panel of the  
 15 Psychiatric Security Review Board shall transfer the young person's case to the adult panel  
 16 of the board if the act that brought the young person within the board's jurisdiction would  
 17 constitute murder or any aggravated form of murder if committed by an adult.

18 (2) At any time after a young person not described in subsection (1) of this section at-  
 19 tains 18 years of age, the juvenile panel of the board may hold a hearing to determine  
 20 whether it is in the young person's best interest to transfer the young person's case to the  
 21 adult panel of the board. The juvenile panel of the board shall transfer the young person's  
 22 case to the adult panel of the board unless good cause is shown for retaining the young  
 23 person's case with the juvenile panel.

24 **SECTION 20.** ORS 161.385 is amended to read:

25 161.385. (1) There is hereby created a Psychiatric Security Review Board consisting of [*five*] 10  
 26 members appointed by the Governor and subject to confirmation by the Senate under section 4,  
 27 Article III of the Oregon Constitution.

28 (2) The membership of the board [*shall*] **may** not include any district attorney, deputy district  
 29 attorney or public defender. [*, but the membership shall be composed of*] **The Governor shall**  
 30 **appoint:**

31 (a) A psychiatrist experienced in the criminal justice system and not otherwise employed on a  
 32 full-time basis by the Department of Human Services or a community mental health and develop-  
 33 mental disabilities program;

34 (b) A licensed psychologist experienced in the criminal justice system and not otherwise em-  
 35 ployed on a full-time basis by the Department of Human Services or a community mental health and  
 36 developmental disabilities program;

37 (c) A member with substantial experience in the processes of parole and probation;

38 [*(d) A member of the general public; and*]

39 [*(e)*] (d) A lawyer with substantial experience in criminal trial practice;

40 (e) A psychiatrist certified, or eligible to be certified, by the Board of Medical Examiners  
 41 in child psychiatry who is experienced in the juvenile justice system and not employed on a  
 42 full-time basis by the Department of Human Services or a community mental health and  
 43 developmental disabilities program;

44 (f) A licensed psychologist who is experienced in child psychology and the juvenile justice  
 45 system and not employed on a full-time basis by the Department of Human Services or a

1 **community mental health and developmental disabilities program;**

2 **(g) A member with substantial experience in the processes of juvenile parole and pro-**  
 3 **bation;**

4 **(h) A lawyer with substantial experience in juvenile law practice; and**

5 **(i) Two members of the general public.**

6 (3) The term of office of each member is four years. The Governor at any time may remove any  
 7 member for inefficiency, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. Before the expiration of the term  
 8 of a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor whose term begins on July 1 next following.  
 9 A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make  
 10 an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

11 (4) A member of the board not otherwise employed full-time by the state[,] shall be paid on a  
 12 per diem basis an amount equal to [§212] **\$289.22**, adjusted according to the executive pay plan for  
 13 the biennium, for each day during which the member is engaged in the performance of official duties,  
 14 including necessary travel time. In addition, subject to ORS 292.220 to 292.250 regulating travel and  
 15 other expenses of state officers and employees, the member shall be reimbursed for actual and nec-  
 16 essary travel and other expenses incurred in the performance of official duties.

17 (5) Subject to any applicable provision of the State Personnel Relations Law, the board may hire

 20 **persons placed under the board's jurisdiction under ORS 161.327 and section 19 of this 2005**  
 21 **Act and consists of those members appointed under subsection (2)(a) to (d) of this section**  
 22 **and one of the public members. The juvenile panel is responsible for young persons placed**  
 23 **under the board's jurisdiction under section 13 of this 2005 Act and consists of those mem-**  
 24 **bers appointed under subsection (2)(e) to (h) of this section and the other public member.**

25 [(6)(a)] **(7)(a) [The board] Each panel** shall select one of its members as chairperson to serve  
 26 for a one-year term with such duties and powers as the [board] **panel** determines.

27 (b) A majority of the voting members of [the board] **a panel** constitutes a quorum for the  
 28 transaction of business **of the panel.**

29 [(7)] **(8) [The board] Each panel** shall meet at least twice every month, unless the chairperson  
 30 determines that there is not sufficient business before the [board] **panel** to warrant a meeting at the  
 31 scheduled time. The [board] **panel** shall also meet at other times and places specified by the call of  
 32 the chairperson or of a majority of the members of the [board] **panel.**

33 [(8)(a)] **(9)(a)** When a person over whom **a panel of** the board exercises its jurisdiction is ad-  
 34 versely affected or aggrieved by a final order of the [board] **panel**, the person is entitled to judicial  
 35 review of the final order. The person is entitled on judicial review to suitable counsel possessing  
 36 skills and experience commensurate with the nature and complexity of the case. If the person is fi-  
 37 nancially eligible, suitable counsel shall be appointed by the reviewing court in the manner provided  
 38 in ORS 138.500 (1). If the person is financially eligible, the public defense services executive director

11 the defendant, in addition to any other monetary obligation imposed, a unitary assessment under this  
12 section. **Except when the person successfully asserts the defense set forth in section 4 of this**  
13 **2005 Act**, the unitary assessment shall also be imposed by the circuit court and county court in  
14 juvenile cases under ORS 419C.005 (1). The unitary assessment is a penal obligation in the nature

24 (A) ORS 811.100 by driving at a speed at least 10 miles per hour greater than is reasonable and  
25 prudent under the circumstances; or

40 (q) The results of psychological examinations of the person;

41 (r) The protection afforded the public by the continued existence of the records; and

42 (s) Any other relevant factors.

43 (4) In a hearing under this section, the juvenile court may receive testimony, reports and other  
 44 evidence without regard to whether the evidence is admissible under ORS 40.010 to 40.210 and  
 45 40.310 to 40.585 if the evidence is relevant to the determination and findings required under this

1 section. As used in this subsection, “relevant evidence” has the meaning given that term in ORS  
2 40.150.

3 (5) When a petition is filed under this section, the state has the right to have a psychosexual
